Effective pitching and timely hitting gave the Tacoma Tigers a double victory over the Wenatchee Chiefs Wednesday night in Wenatchee for a 3-1 edge in their current Western International league series.

They won the first game 3-2 when Bill Brenner, sent in as a pinchhitter in the ninth, hit a double scoring Marv Rickert with the tying run and scored the winning marker on Milt Gedinha's single.

Rickert hit two homers in the seven-inning nightcap which the Tigers won 5-0. Lefty Isakke fanned eight and allowed only four hits. Russel Christopher, on the mound for the Chiefs, struck out seven and gave up six hits.

The league leading Spokane Indians continued their winning ways over the second place Salem Senators, scoring a 13-4 victory on Pete Jonas' six-hit pitching in Spokane. Jonas struck out nine.

The Vancouver Capilanos connected for 22 hits and a 16-4 victory over the Yakima Pippins in Yakima. Tom Lloyd hit four for six. Jack Whipple got a homer for the Pippins in the sixth.

Letters Exchanged on Lamm Camp Dispute, Sale of Logs To Lamm By Kesterson Firm

Kesterson Lumber corporation made public Thursday an exchange of letters between the company and local 6-12 of the CIO International Woodworkers of America, concerning the Lamm logging camp labor dispute and the sale of logs to the Lamm company by the Klamath Timber company. Kesterson's logging subsidiary.

The letters follow:

Dear Mr. Kesterson:

At a meeting called by International Woodworkers of America local union No. 6-12, CIO at the camp of the Klamath Timber company, July 8, 1940, for all employees of the Klamath Timber company, this local was authorized to write you the following letter without a dissenting vote.

The employees of the Klamath Timber company are in accord with the action taken by our brother workers employed by the Lamm Lumber company in their logging camp. We are backing them to our fullest extent in their present dispute with the Lamm Lumber company.

We believe that your company or any other selling the Lamm Lumber company logs will not settle the present dispute but will only add fire to the existing conditions.

Through your office we urge you to use your influence to bring about a satisfactory settlement of the present Lamm labor dispute.

Gentlemen:
Your letter of July 9, wherein you urged us to use our influence to bring about a settlement of the present Lamm labor dispute, is acknowledged.

We believe labor disputes should be settled between the interested employer and employees without involving employees of other operations, or other employers. The present unemployment resulting from the strike at Lamm's camp was no doubt caused by too hasty action, and we are not in accord with either the weapon of strike or lockout until every effort has been made and a reasonable time allowed to settle differences by discussion and negotiation.

Lamm Lumber company has not requested us to deliver additional logs. However, in the event the Lamm company requires more logs, and we have

them to spare, we will feel no hesitancy in making deliveries, but it would be for the sole purpose of keeping the Lamm mill in operation to furnish the Lamm employees steady employment.

We believe the most important thing for the people of this basin, as a whole, is to keep men employed. We intend to do our part in furnishing employment consistent with economic conditions. You might be interested in knowing that during the past six months the pine lumber market has been steadily slumping, and it is important employees and employers cooperate in every way to keep the plants in operation.

Reports from the Klamath Timber company's camp are that approximately 12 men, out of a total of 115, took affirmative action on matters in support of this action by your union. It is said there were about 50 men present.

In the event you have any suggestions to offer, whereby we might be helpful in bringing about a satisfactory settlement of the dispute at Lamm's woods camp, we would be very pleased to hear from you. We would urge, however, both parties to the dispute use every effort in settling their own differences. In the meantime, we do not believe the employees at the Lamm lumber operation at Modoc Point or the employees of any other operation should suffer from unemployment by reason of the unsettled dispute at Lamm's camp.

WOMEN GET REST, VACATION AT CAMP

Rural women's vacation camps are again being sponsored in several sections of the state this year, with members of the Oregon State college extension staff directing the programs.

For women in the Willamette valley and Deschutes county a single camp in the Silver Creek recreation area is to be used for four camping periods from July 16 to August 8. Klamath and Jackson counties are arranging a joint camp from July 14 to 18 at the Willow Springs camp ground at Lake o' the Woods. Josephine county is arranging a camp from July 21 to 25 and Malheur county from August 14 to 18.

In all of these camps a nominal charge is made to cover the expense of the camp, which also includes all necessary camp work so that the women are relieved of everything in the way of cooking, dishwashing, or other things that would mar a home-maker's vacation. The camps are open to enrollment by any woman over 18 years of age. Those who wish to enroll from Klamath county or the Tulelake district for the Klamath-Jackson camp should get in touch with Winnifred Gillen, home demonstration agent, whose office is in the Post Office building.

These camps are planned to give those who attend a good rest, new interests and new friends, says Miss Izola Jensen, rural recreation specialist of the extension service. A typical camp program includes classes in several crafts, sing periods, nature walks, health, book and

travel talks, swimming and vesper and camp fire programs. A library will be provided at most of the camps so that book lovers will have a wealth of reading material available.

HAND PRESSURE TELLS POLICE OF SUICIDE

PORTLAND, July 11 (AP)—The pressure of a dying man's hand told Dr. Joseph Beeman of a suicide Wednesday.

Sheriff M. R. Calhoun of St. Helens found John Lennon, 35, with a deep cut on the left wrist and a fractured jaw. The officer first believed the man a victim of a fight but there were

no signs of a scuffle. He concluded Lennon cut his wrist and injured his jaw in the fall. Dr. Beeman of the state crime laboratory found Lennon unable to talk at a Portland hospital. By pressure on the doctor's hand indicated replies of "yes" or "no," Lennon admitted taking his own life.

TRAVEL DOWN

SALEM, July 11 (UP)—Oregon tourist travel is 10 per cent below that of last year, Secretary of State Earl Snell reported Tuesday.

Snell said 47,292 tourists registered in Oregon during the first six months of this year compared to 53,014 in a like period of 1939.

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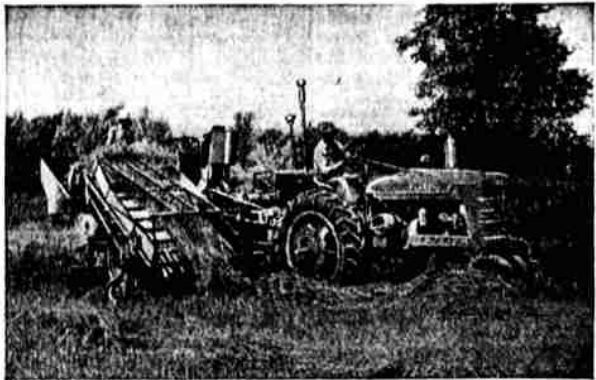
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
