TRAFFIC DEATHS AT NEW HIGH IN STATE

SALEM, July 12 (AP)—A new record of 160 persons died in Oregon traffic accidents during the first half of 1940, being 10 more than the total for the similar period of 1937 when the previous high mark was set. Twenty-one more persons were killed during the first half of 1940 than during the first six months of last year, Secretary of State Earl Snell said.

The June total of 35 was a new record for the month and was an increase of 10 over the June, 1939, total. Of the 35 persons killed in June, eight were pedestrians.

VIOLATIONS OF WAGE-HOUR LAW NUMEROUS—ASH

PORTLAND, July 12 (UP)—Employers of the Oregon lumber industry are willing to cooperate with the wage-hour administration but violations of the wage-hour act have been numerous, Wesley O. Ash, western director, said Wednesday.

Ash said failure to pay required overtime wages was the most frequent violation. He said employers promised compliance whenever advised of their laxity. The wage-hour director said investigations should not be considered punitive drives but rather a method of obtaining compliance. He pointed out that employers who want to comply are protected from unfair competition and employees are given the benefit of the act.

TWO BRUSH FIRES AT BONANZA OUT

Two small fires in grass and brush near Bonanza were quickly extinguished Friday morning, the county fire warden's office at Bonanza reported to Klamath Forest Protective officers here. Otherwise, the situation on the forest front was quiet here Friday. Humidity was low and a light breeze swept over the district, making fire danger acute.

ITALY ANNOUNCES FLIER CASUALTIES

ROME, July 12 (AP)—Military headquarters announced Thursday that 151 Italian fliers were killed or missing and 103 wounded in the first 20 days of the war against Britain. A list of casualties headed by the name of Marshal Italo Balbo (recently killed in Africa) showed 76 dead and 75 missing up to June 30.

CIO LEADERS HERE FOR IWA MEETING

John Brost, president of the Oregon state CIO, and Worth Lowry, newly elected vice president of the International Woodworkers of America, CIO affiliate, will be in Klamath Falls Saturday for a special meeting of the local IWA union. The meeting will start at 10 a. m. at the IWA hall.

Local officers attending will be Howard Dyer of Susanville, Calif., president of the Klamath basin IWA district council, and L. H. Fenton, international representative. An invitation has also been extended William Dalrymple, CIO director for Oregon.

Arriving Friday to make preparations for the meeting, Dyer asserted that the IWA has recently won important concessions from the L. D. Fox logging operations at Canyon dam, near Westwood, Calif. He said that through negotiations the union has obtained higher wages, assurance that tools and filers will be furnished by the employer, and back pay since October 24, 1938.

BUDGET MESSAGE INCLUDES FEW DEFINITE JOBS

WASHINGTON, July 12 (AP)—A budget message which accompanied President Roosevelt's request for additional defense funds Wednesday specified only general objects of army expenditures, but named some of the projects covered by the \$936,176,540 proposed for the navy. Among them were:

- Keyport, Wash., naval torpedo station, torpedo store house, etc., \$825,000.
- Puget Sound ammunition depot power plant, etc., \$534,000.
- Kodiak, Alaska, air station, seaplane ramp, etc., \$505,000.
- Seattle air station grading and improvement outlying fields, \$150,000; additional gasoline storage, \$100,000.
- Sitka, Alaska, air station, extend seaplane hangar, \$500,000.
- Bainbridge Island, Wash., radio station, \$75,000.
- Dutch Harbor, Alaska, radio station, \$30,000.
- Eureka, Calif., radio station, \$15,000.
- Point Arguello, Calif., radio station, \$33,000.

Those who wish to receive bids to become pledges of Greek letter living organizations must come to the campus earlier, however. Coed "rush" will open September 18, while fraternity men will open their drives for new members two days later.

LOCAL CIO VOTES OPPOSITION TO BRIDGES BILL

Vigorous opposition to HR 9766, the Bridges deportation bill, is expressed in a resolution adopted by auxiliary 6-16 of the International Woodworkers of America, local CIO affiliate.

The resolution alleged the proposed measure is a bill of attainder of a type rejected by President Thomas Jefferson 142 years ago and that it nullifies constitutional guarantees. It charges the motives behind the bill is dislike for Bridges by employing interests.

The auxiliary voted to exert all possible influence upon congressmen and senators from this region asking them to vote against HR 9766.

GOP TICKETS MAY BOOM OLSON PLAN

SACRAMENTO, Cal., July 12 The selection of Senator Charles L. McNary of Oregon to be the republican running mate for Wendell Willkie may be the turning point in a campaign by friends of Gov. Culbert Olson to boom him for the democratic vice presidential nomination.

When the republicans made a tie-up with a far-western man, the democrats had a bolstered argument that bourbons might well employ the same strategy.

The Olson movement, while largely confined so far within the membership of the California delegation, has several advantages at this writing, outlined by his backers as follows: 1. The consistently cordial relations between President Roosevelt and the California governor. Olson is also chairman of the California Roosevelt delegation and they see eye to eye on national affairs.

2. The carefully-planned itinerary and program for a caravan of state delegations to the Chicago convention. By constant exposure to the Olson movement on the trip the delegates from the west should have quite an Olson sentiment worked up to attract the attention of the convention.
