

OREGON FARMS PREPARED, AAA REPORT CLAIMS

ROOSEVELT PLEDGE WAKES CONJECTURE

The AAA farm program, with its encouragement of conservation and assistance in marketing, has helped materially in increasing Oregon's "agricultural preparedness," says the newly-released annual report for 1939 of the Oregon agricultural conservation committee.

Four leading farmers comprise the committee, William Steen of Milton, chairman, William Enschede of Hillsboro, John Shepherd of Seilo, and Robert Weir of Lakeview.

"At the time this report is being prepared," says the publication, "the word 'preparedness' is on the lips of everyone. No matter what America's future duties become, Oregon farmers will be well prepared to help with supplying food."

"Since the beginning of the AAA (in 1933), Oregon's farm lands have been improved and farmers have gained in security and efficiency. The AAA organization, having 174 county committees and 1026 community committees in Oregon, would be ready at moment's notice to operate effectively in meeting any demands upon the state's agriculture."

More than 36,000 Oregon farmers participated in the 1939 farm program, representing about 94 per cent of the state's crop land. They received about six million dollars in federal payments.

With Oregon's 1939 agricultural income for total well above 100 million dollars AAA payments were less than 6 per cent of this amount; yet, they acted as a powerful incentive to better farming, the report points out.

Among aids to Oregon agriculture in 1939, as listed in the report, were adjustment of wheat acreage in line with demand, crop loans to wheat growers, crop insurance on wheat, financial aid to sugar beet and fiber flax growers, improvement of water and grass resources on the range, and promotion of conservation aids such as lime, phosphate, cover crops, trashy fallow, created wheat grasses, legumes and perennial grasses.

ROOSEVELT PLEDGE WAKES CONJECTURE

WASHINGTON, July 12 (UP)—President Roosevelt's pledge that the United States will not send men to participate in European wars drew these political interpretations from congressmen Wednesday night:

1—The administration will sponsor a no-war plank in the democratic platform.

2—A third party—threatened by Sen. Burton K. Wheeler (D-Mont.)—is "out" if the democratic national convention follows the chief executive's pledge.

3—Mr. Roosevelt will seek a third term.

Fish Interpretation

The third-term interpretation came from Rep. Hamilton Fish, New York republican, who said "The campaign message to congress by President Roosevelt on national defense is positive proof that he will be a candidate for renomination next week."

Wheeler himself was authorized by the statement that third party talk would disappear if the 1940 democratic platform contains Mr. Roosevelt's pledge.

He has threatened to bolt and carry the presidential standard for a third party if the democrats develop into a "war party."

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Try These Examples of Uses Of Vegetables in Casserole

Take a basket of garden vegetables, a sheet aluminum or glass casserole which can be used either in the oven or on top of the stove, and these recipes. Then call in the folks for "cass."

Vegetable Casserole
(Serves six)

One cup cooked carrots, sliced Julienne; 1 cup cooked green beans, sliced Julienne; 1 cup

cooked fresh or whole kernel corn, 1 tablespoon chopped parsley, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 teaspoon scraped onion, 2 tablespoons flour, 2 cups milk, 1 cup grated American cheese, salt, pepper and paprika to taste. Cook vegetables until barely tender. Prepare as directed. Make cream sauce. Add the scraped onion and seasonings. In bottom of greased casserole, arrange layer of carrots, then a

layer of cream sauce, then beans, more cream sauce, then corn sprinkled with parsley, and lastly, cream sauce. Sprinkle grated cheese over top. Bake in moderate oven (350 deg. F.) for about 25 minutes until slightly browned.

Russian Beet Soup
(Six Servings)

Two and one-half cups fresh cooked beets, 1 cup lemon juice, 2 tablespoons minced onion, 3 cups water, 2 cups heavy sour cream, parsley.

Cut beets in Julienne strips; place in a two-quart top of the stove casserole or glass saucepan. Add lemon juice and minced onion; then add the water and the heavy cream. Bring to a boil; remove from direct heat. Add a few sprigs of parsley and serve from the saucepan as a soup tureen. This is also a delicious summer soup when served and iced.
