BLISTER SPOILS DAY PHILADELPHIA, July 13

(AP)—A blister kept Cleveland's Bobby Feller from chalking up his second no-hit, no-run game of the season, says Rollie Hemsley, Feller's battery mate.

The 21-year-old Iowa boy turned in a 1 to 0, one-hit performance against the Athletics Friday night.

For seven innings the pride of Van Meter, Iowa, mowed down the A's without a hit, only one man reaching first by getting a walk. Then Dick Siebert, first man up for the A's in the eighth, singled over second base.

"Siebert's a first-ball hitter," Hemsley declared. "If it wasn't for that blister we'd have curved him on the first pitch. But the blister gave Bob trouble when he tried to throw a hook so we gave Siebert a fast one and he hit it."

In the other night game, played in the National League, the Philadelphia Phillies trimmed the Pittsburgh Pirates, 6-3, behind the seven-hit pitching of Hugh Mulcahy. The win was a Mulcahy's eighth of the season and snapped a four-game Pirate winning streak.

It was Feller's 14th victory of the year and the fourth one-hitter of his career. He fanned 13 batters and walked two.

For seven innings Feller had a no-hit game in sight. Up to that time the only Philadelphia pitcher to reach base was Al Brancato, who walked with two out in the fourth. Siebert led off the eighth, however, with a brisk single to center. Rubelung then walked and both runners advanced on a wild pitch, the only Athletics to pass first base.

Babich held the Indians to six hits for eight innings and George Caster pitched a hitless ninth. Cleveland's run came in the third on doubles by Ben Chapman and Lou Boudreau.
