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and an indefinite number of coast defense units. Indications were that a training period of perhaps a year was contemplated.

### Permit Expected

Congress will be asked to grant the president the partial mobilization authority as soon as it reconvenes July 22. Under existing law, the president can call out the guard only to meet a threatened invasion or to deal with insurrection or disorder.

An intensive effort to fill up the local units of the Oregon National guard was started Saturday.

Sixty-five vacancies are to be filled. There are no requirements for camp or regular training, except that the reserve guardsman will be called in case of mobilization.

### Last Chance

Captain T. D. Case of Battery A pointed out that this is the last opportunity to join the local outfit. He said it is important that recruiting be completed in the next week, and urged all interested young men to call immediately at the armory for information.

At present, the two local batteries have 126 active members and 17 on the inactive list. With 65 added to the inactive list, in the present recruiting program, the units will have a strength of 208.

# GAME BOARD REJECTS DOE SEASON HERE

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to another open season on antlerless deer. Recommendations along this line were forwarded to the game commission by both organizations.

The Klamath county chamber of commerce voiced a slightly different stand on the question in a letter recommendation mailed to the commission this week. The chamber, expressing an opinion on the question for the first time, voted in favor of an open season on does with the important provision that an open season is advocated only if figures compiled by the state game commission showed that another open season was desirable.

At a special meeting Monday night at the Lake County Sportsmen's association at Lakeview, that group unanimously recommended that the southern half of the mule deer refuge from the Lakeview-Klamath Falls highway be opened this year to the shooting of does. One thousand licenses were recommended by the association to be issued for does. Last year 400 doe tags were issued by the game commission in an experimental open season.

The Lake county group's stand, as expressed by President Austin Smith, was based on the contention that the number of deer in the mule deer refuge, if not controlled now, would grow out of control within two or three years and the deer would starve. The group recommended also that the entire refuge be opened for bucks.

# 23-YEAR-OLD INDIAN REPORTED MISSING

A description was furnished Saturday by Buster J. Dickens and Arlene R. Dickens of an Indian who has been missing since June 18. He is Carman Riddle, a resident of Beatty.

The two said the youth, 23 years of age, was last seen between 5 and 6 p. m. on June 18, walking east from the Klamath Indian Agency. He had left the agency hospital without permission and was last seen by a group of persons who said he was walking along one of the roads nearby.

He was described as weighing 167 pounds and standing 5 feet 7 inches in height. On his left forearm was a tattoo of a horseshoe, with the words "Good Luck" and his initials, C. R., inscribed in the center of the horseshoe.

Anyone with information as to his whereabouts is asked to get in touch with the Indian Agency.

# NAZIS, ITALY CLAIM SUCCESS AGAINST NAVY

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and made it ineffective, were reported today.

At the same time, repeated hits with big bombs on two British cruisers and a battleship were claimed in the running, week-long naval and air battle in the Mediterranean.

### Destroyer Sunk

The loss of an Italian destroyer "as a result of enemy bombardment"—the second to go to the bottom since units of the two navies first met in action on Monday—was officially acknowledged.

The action at Malta yesterday, reported by official news agency Stefani, was centered on British airfields. Planes on the ground were machine gunned and hangars were bombed.

The latest naval brush began Thursday, the Italian high command communique saying that a British naval formation was "constantly pounded throughout the day by our aviation."
