CHICAGO, July 16 (AP)—Secretary Perkins forecast President Roosevelt's acceptance of a third-term nomination today as delegates to this national convention were lifted by a real peak of excitement by word that a presidential announcement was forthcoming.

SMOKE JUMPER CREWS SUCCEED IN FIRST TEST

SAN FRANCISCO, July 16 (AP)—"Smoke Jumpers," parachuting down on baby forest fires, are the newest and most spectacular branch of the U. S. forest service which guards millions of acres of timberland in the Pacific Northwest.

The flying firemen, who have been training and testing this spring in Montana and Washington, have been a complete success, the forest service reported here.

Already they have knocked out small lightning fires around Okanogan, Wash., preventing costly blaze in remote areas.

This summer's annual fire season, when lightning, logging and laziness dot the northwest with thousands of blazes, will give the smoke jumpers their final test.

All dressed up for a forest fire, a smoke jumper vaguely resembles an altitude flyer, a halfback, a catcher and the wrath of God.

He pulls on a bright red canvas suit, bristling with zippers. A yellow football helmet, a heavy wire mask and a high flaring collar protect him from the neck up. His parachute and heavy shoes complete the wardrobe.

With his pilot, the smoke jumper flies out on patrol, over the vast, green country that is inaccessible even to pack mules. That is where they are heading—where the fire trucks and mounted patrolmen can't go fast enough.

Test 'Chute Dropped'—They spot a wisp of smoke and fly over it, dropping a small burlap test 'chute with a 10-pound sandbag and checking it for wind drift. The next time around, the smoke jumper takes off and on the third lap the pilot drops another burlap chute with tools, lamps, radio, two days' rations, first aid kit, water and other supplies.

The smoke jumper, coasting down to his landing, picks his spot, guiding the parachute by pulling the shrouds. His 30-foot parachute lets him down at 12 feet a second the ordinary 'chute drops at 18.

A nice, close stand of green pine is a "feather bed landing." He avoids rough, steep slopes, fallen timber and old snags.

After floating into the tree branches, he detaches his harness and lets himself down with a rope thoughtfully carried in one of his zipper pockets. Then he starts looking for his supply 'chute, which will be along in a moment, flapping a huge yellow streaker for easy spotting.

Reports by Radio—After attacking his fire, he reports to his station by a small short-wave radio which weighs only a few pounds. If the fire was easy, he makes his way out to a ranger station. If not, he calls for more help.

The smoke jumpers now are maintained in two units, at Okanogan, Wash., to patrol the Chelan National forest, and at Moose creek, Mont., for the Bitter Root forest.

Laval Explains Plans for Rehabilitation of France

(Note: Pierre Laval, the "strong man" of France's new totalitarian regime, explains the government's plans for the rehabilitation of France and her 40,000,000 people in the following exclusive interview with The United Press.)

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VICHY, France, July 13 (Delayed)—France is through being "a humanitarian crusader for other nations" and will devote her efforts toward a national reconstruction within the framework of a European bloc of states, Vice Premier Pierre Laval said in an interview today.

As perpetual vice-premier in France's new authoritarian regime and eventual successor to the 84-year-old Marshal Henri Philippe Pétain as "chief of the French state," Laval today holds authority equalling that of any European dictator.

Laval outlined to me what he called the "audacious" policies of the new government.

The chief aims of the Pétain regime, as outlined by Laval, included:

1. The restoration of national order and food and work for the nation's populace rather than any world-wide crusading in defense of any regime or political theories.

Ernest Robin, 37-year-old employee of the Kesterson Lumber corporation logging camp, died at 12:45 p. m. Tuesday of injuries received last Saturday in a logging camp industrial accident. He was a resident of Klamath Falls for 35 years and is survived by his wife, Mrs. Lavinia Robin, one daughter, Adelia Robin, his mother, Mrs. Ivan Kilgore, all of Klamath Falls; also seven brothers and two sisters.

Robin received skull fracture and severe scalp lacerations when struck by a flying piece of logging equipment. Funeral arrangements are being made at the Earl Whitlock funeral home.

DOWN TO 12TH
SAN FRANCISCO, July 16 (AP)—Preliminary census figures released here today showed a drop in population for San Francisco of 4,007 persons from the 1930 figure of 634,394. As a result of the decline San Francisco went down to 12th place in the rank of the nation's largest cities, having been passed by Washington, D. C., which climbed 176,284 to 663,153.

2. The return of 10,000,000 French war refugees to their homes.

4. Banning of strikes and lockouts.

5. Banishing of all "international doctrines" and elimination from power of all persons who had any role in the popular front government under Leon Blum, socialist leader.

6. The government will "use authoritative language if necessary to establish salutary discipline."

7. A friendly press will be sought to support the government's reconstruction efforts.

Laval said that France is determined to become "self-centered" and work solely for the solution of her own immediate problems.

"From now on," he asserted, "French policy will have as its axis audacious but generous social conceptions as a basis for national reconstruction within the framework of a European bloc of nations."

"After her brief but costly lesson France is through for the time-being with being a humanitarian crusader for other nations."

KESTERSON ISSUE HANDED TO NLRB

A series of meetings of the employees of the Kesterson Lumber corporation was climaxed Monday night when, at a meeting at the IWA hall, the Kesterson membership voted to refer the matter of a sole collective bargaining agency at the Kesterson plant to the national labor relations board. The meeting followed several conferences between the plant negotiating committee and officials of the lumber concern.

L. H. Fenton, International IWA representative, said that by this action the Kesterson corporation is charged with refusal to bargain. The employees have requested the NLRB to make an immediate investigation, Fenton said.

Fenton also stated that employees of Long Bell camp No. 1, in Modoc county, California, have voted to open negotiations with the Long Bell company, and that a letter from the employees has been sent officials of the company requesting a meeting with a negotiating committee at the company's convenience.

EMPLOYMENT TAX LIMITS DEFINED

SALEM—Employers who pay out more than \$500 in any quarter and have four or more employees are subject to the unemployment compensation law, declares Administrator Silas Gaiser, in warning short-time operators that 2.7 per cent contributions must be paid on all covered payrolls.

"Workers should make sure that they are covered under the law," says Gaiser, "as past experience has shown many applications for unemployment benefits filed against employers who have not registered with the commission. Serious delay in the determination of benefits is likely unless payroll reports and contributions have been made regularly."

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WOUNDED CCC BOY REPORTED BETTER

Lowell McFadden, Camp Klamath CCC youth shot by a mysterious assailant Saturday night at Merrill, was further improved Tuesday and is expected to recover.

Meanwhile, indications were that officers were still without definite clues as to the identity of the man who leaped from an old car and seemingly without provocation fired into a group of CCC boys.

One tip fizzled out when a trio of Siskiyou county men, detained at Medicine lake for questioning, proved conclusively they had nothing to do with the shooting. They were suspected by a citizen who thought they were going by way of Medicine lake to avoid the California quarantine checking stations on main highways. It turned out they were going to Medicine lake for a picnic.

Officers are making a thorough investigation of what clues are available. District Attorney L. Orth Sisemore, Deputy Sheriff Dale Mattoon and State Police Sergeant Louis Johnson have been working on the case with officers at Merrill and Tulelake cooperating.

McFadden, in Hillside hospital, is said to know as little about the shooting as anyone. He could give questioners no reason for the assault.
