

LOCAL GUARDS SCHEDULED TO BE MOBILIZED

SALEM, July 17 (AP)—Oregon's 249th coast artillery, including 600 officers and men, will be one of seven coast artillery regiments to be mobilized, Major General George A. White said today.

General White said final announcement must come from Washington, D. C., but that advance reports indicate that the 249th will be sent to Camp Clatsop as soon as congress gives authority.

The general said it was not yet known whether coast artillery units of the Washington national guard would be mobilized. These units, however, are not under General White's command, as are other national guard units of Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming.

The 249th, recently modernized, includes two battalions, one of which fires anti-aircraft machine guns and the three-inch anti-aircraft guns, while the other fires six-inch and 10-inch seacoast batteries.

Colonel Clifton Irwin of Salem commands the regiment, units of which are located at Salem, Albany, Cottage Grove, Marshfield, Ashland and Klamath Falls.

Mobilization of the coast artillery will increase to 4800 men taken from Oregon. This number probably will be increased by recruiting another 1000 men when the entire guard is mobilized, probably early in August.

Units of the 249th, which recently was at Camp Clatsop for a 15-day training period, are:

Headquarters battery, Salem; Searchlight battery, Salem; Medical detachment, Salem; Headquarters battery, first battalion, Salem; Battery A (seacoast), Klamath Falls; Battery B (seacoast), Ashland; Battery C (seacoast), Klamath Falls; Headquarters battery, second battalion, Salem; Battery D (three-inch anti-aircraft), Albany; Battery E (three-inch anti-aircraft), Cottage Grove; and Battery F (anti-aircraft machine gun), Marshfield.

The band, stationed at Marshfield, also will be mobilized.

General White said he did not know the other six coast artillery regiments over the nation to be mobilized.

GUARD CALL MAY DELAY CAMP DATE

SALEM, July 17 (UP)—Mobilization of the national guard by President Roosevelt may delay opening of the guard camp at Fort Lewis beyond the scheduled date of August 4, Maj. Gen. George A. White said yesterday.

Gen. White said a ten-day warning period must follow, according to statute, after congress acts on the president's plan for mobilization of the national guard.

He also said Oregon probably would get 40 or 50 new officers under a mobilization order which would increase the officer personnel to a new table of "full peace-time strength," with more than 2000 officers in the United States.

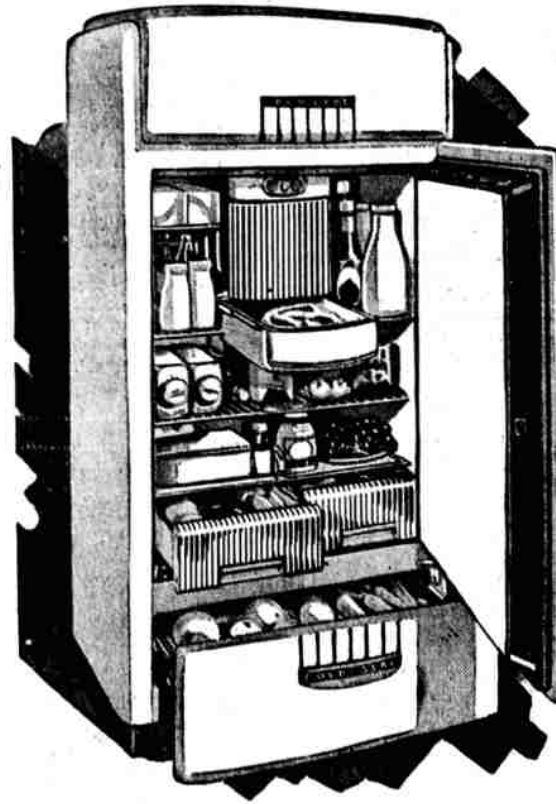
