2000 FED AT BIG CHAMBER BARBECUE

TULELAKE—Barbecued beef and baked beans, buns and coffee, and lemonade with ice cream for the small folks, were on the menu for more than 2000 guests of the Tulelake chamber of commerce who gathered from communities of southern Oregon, northern California and from distant points, trekking to the Tulelake lake via the Lava Beds for the second annual picnic of the chamber.

Weather was perfect for the event and officials at checking stations in the monument were rushed to keep up with the steady stream of cars that wound up the mountain.

Arrivals were entertained with a snappy exhibition of surf board riding by "Toad Boyd," Tulelake, who was whipped through the water balanced on his head. Jack Chapman also of Tulelake was on the program with Boyd and both "professionals" were roundly applauded.

LAKE COUNTY MEN BUY CARAKUL HERD

WESTWIDE—Richard Buck and George Stockburger, Goose Lake valley farmers, recently purchased from an Idaho company several head of Carakul sheep in a venture which may prove to be the start of a new industry for Lake county. Mr. Buck purchased five head and a buck, all registered, and Mr. Stockburger has seven head and a registered buck.

The fur from newly-born Carakul lambs is used to make valuable Persian lamb, or Carakul, fur coats. The United States imports 98 per cent of the Carakul fur it uses, although there are in this country 10,000 Carakul sheep, imported originally from Bokhara in central Asia near Persia.

Since this breed of sheep is very hardy and can withstand severe winters and comparatively poor pasture conditions, Mr. Buck and Mr. Stockburger do not expect the climate here at 4800 feet to cause them any difficulty in raising these sheep.

Normally there can be two lambings a year. Mr. Buck plans to lamb for the first time in February, which is at least a month before sheepmen ordinarily lamb in the valley. Lambs are killed and skinned at or soon after birth. The fur is black, flat, and tightly curled or waved.

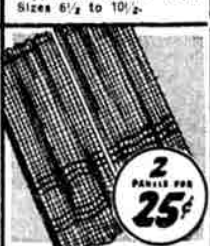

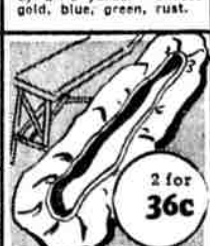
