MULE DEER POLL

Reaction to the state game commission's edict to throw open the mule deer refuge in western Lake county is favorable, for the most part, among Klamath Falls sportsmen.

In a miniature Gallup pole of the city opposition to the idea was expressed by a small percentage of old-time hunters—most everyone believes along with the game commissioners that throwing the refuge open to buck hunters for the first time in 13 years will have desirable effects. But just as widespread is the belief that the refuge should not be held open more than one season.

PRO AND CON

Principal arguments against opening the refuge, and nearly all opponents voiced the same arguments, are:

1. A large number of out-of-state and upstate hunters will be drawn to southern Oregon, resulting in a tremendous kill inside the refuge boundaries and in the area bordering the refuge during the first part of the season.

2. This kill will be so great that the mule deer herd will be seriously depleted, resulting in many lean years for mule deer hunting in the future, and possibly in a closure of mule deer hunting for several seasons, especially if a hard winter and other natural causes happen to take an unusually heavy toll.

3. The deer will not be scattered, but will return to the refuge where they have gained protection for years.

On the other hand, the majority of hunters put up these arguments in favor of opening the refuge:

1. The mule deer herd, habitually accustomed to the safety of the refuge, should be scattered so that more widespread breeding will produce better animals.

2. An open refuge would not draw more out-of-state and upstate hunters than were drawn last year, when an open deer season attracted many newcomers.

3. Opening the refuge will scatter the bucks in all directions, preventing the tremendous annual slaughter that takes place in the narrow wedge-shaped area between the southern border of the refuge and the state line, through which the deer usually travel in great numbers to feeding grounds in northern California.

One proponent voiced the novel argument that the refuge should be opened to frustrate the "60 or 70 hunters who kill deer within the refuge the year around." These homesteaders and loggers should not be protected in their poaching, this veteran argued.

The commission, without explanation, summoned Armstrong, Jenkins, Eddie Mead, Armstrong's manager and Mike Jacobs, promoter, to appear Friday.

Henry Armstrong, the perpetual motion batter from Los Angeles, halted the victory march of Lew Jenkins, the Texas knock-out artist, Wednesday night by beating Lew into such bloody helplessness that Referee Arthur Donovan stopped the bout at the end of the sixth round.

Lightweight Champion Jenkins almost fell off his stool in his corner as Donovan intervened, after Armstrong, the welterweight champion, had floored blood-stained Jenkins six times during the scheduled 12-round bout.

Although no title was at stake at the Polo Grounds because of a weight agreement, Armstrong at 27½ years old smashed his way to greater glory by registering the technical knockout, which was announced from the ring officially as coming in the sixth round, since the bell had not rung for the seventh.

Staggered to Corner
Jenkins, after being floored three times in the sixth session, staggered to his corner, lurched down upon his stool and turned his bloody face to his seconds for sponging.

Manager Hymie Caplin threw a sponge of cold water into his face and Jenkins began to slump sideways from the stool.

The Texas youngster of 23, who wrested the light-weight title from Lou Ambers in May and who was working on a string of eight straight knockouts—was through for the evening.

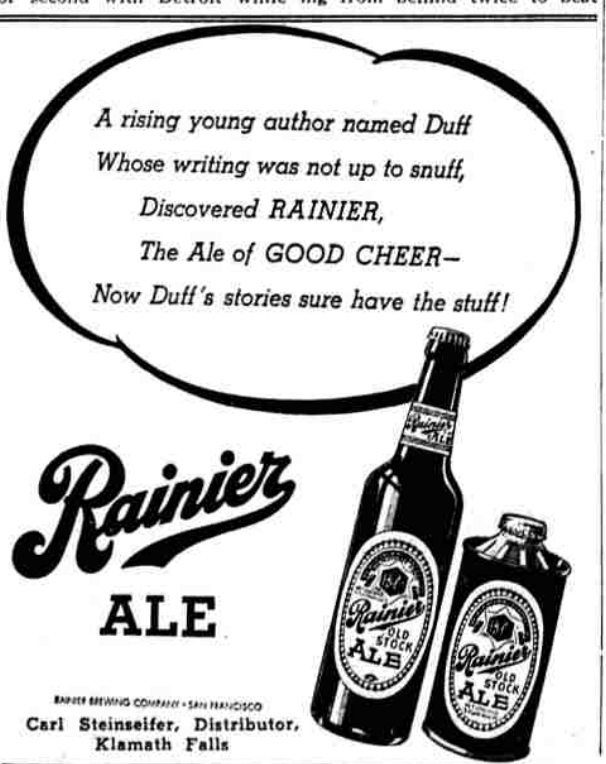
