

Hostak and Zale Ready for Scrap

SEATTLE, July 18 (AP) — A couple of middleweights who punch so hard they have trouble getting fights, will take it out on each other under the stars here Friday night in a 15-round bout for the 46-state NBA middleweight title.

The sluggers are Al Hostak of Seattle, the titleholder, and Tony Zale of Gary, Ind., the challenger.

Managers of both fighters complain their boys have carpentered so many gladiators that the top notch fancy dan boxers won't have anything to do with them.

Hostak has had only five fights since winning the crown here from Freddie Steele in 1938. Zale has fought about a dozen times under his present handlers, Sam Paine and Art Winch of Chicago, Paine and Winch agree with Eddie Marino, Hostak's pilot, that it's hard to coax anybody into the ring with a puncher.

That's about all that the Paine-Winch combination and Marino do agree about. Of Friday night's scrap, both sides are violently partisan, with neither conceding the other's fighter a chance.

Paine and Winch insist that Zale will take the title back to the midwest and at the same time prove that his 10-round non-title win over Hostak in Chicago last winter was no fluke. The loss generally has been blamed on Hostak breaking his left hand in the fifth round, but the Paine-Winch chorus intones that Tony was belacking the champion prior to the mauling of the maulie.

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HOLLYWOOD STARS NAMED AS REDS

BEAUMONT, Tex., July 18 (AP)—A spokesman said the Dies committee, investigating un-American activities, was given today a list naming 42 of Hollywood's most prominent screen figures as members of and financial contributors to the communist party.

Approximately 60 per cent of those named were members of the party and the rest furnished money and other support, the spokesman said the committee was told in closed session.

Rep. Martin Dies (D-Tex.), chairman of the house committee scrutinizing un-American activities, has for several days been acting as a one-man subcommittee digging into alleged evidence of communist and fascist activities.

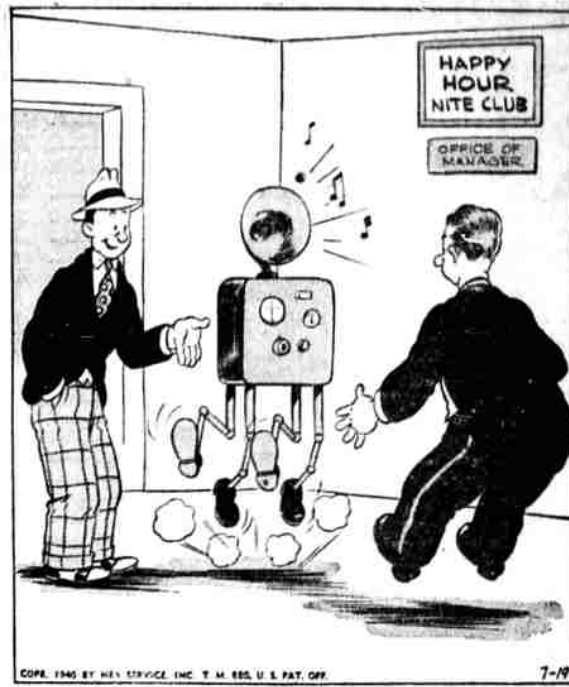
The list revealed by the committee embraced actors, actresses, directors, producers and writers.

The testimony of John L. Leech of Portland, Ore., who yesterday outlined what he said was the general communist program on the west coast, today detailed, the committee spokesman said, activities in the film colony. Important figures of the moving picture industry, he said, gathered in special study groups to discuss communism, make plans and raise funds.

The professional group in Hollywood, it was learned he told the committee, contributed \$1200 to \$1500 a month to the party exclusive of campaign contributions and special assessments.

Leech described himself as a former communist leader in California. He said he was expelled by the communist party in 1937 and recently had been employed by the commission of public docks in Portland, Ore.

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Sea Cucumbers May Replace Clams to Improve Chowder

FRIDAY HARBOR, Wash., July 18 (AP)—Add cooking school notes: Clam chowder may taste better if you don't use clams.

Sea cucumbers, a marine growth found attached to rocks, pilings and other under-water obstacles, are the substitute and wives of University of Washington faculty members here are even canning them. They attain a length of three feet and are brightly colored, like a rainbow.

Dr. Thomas G. Thompson, director of the university's oceanographic laboratories, extolled the sea cucumber's good qualities today. He said that one Washington state cannery near Olympia is already putting them on the market.

Dr. Thompson, who's always suspicious of seafood sources, said the chances are now ten to one that "clam chowder" served in hospitals is made from them. He said he had also investigated such chowder served on three different railroads and found that sea cucumbers, not clams, were the chief ingredient.

"But that's so much the better," he added. "Sea cucumbers have a better flavor and are more easily digested than clams. The Chinese have been eating them for years, but they don't have the right idea. They boil and smoke them. The only way to do is to boil them for chowder or can them and eat chowder next winter."

Under their dress-up name, sea cucumbers are known as "holothuria tubulosa." The meat is white and rather tough. The "trade" calls them "rallops."
