HARRIMAN LODGE at Rocky Point is still the old standby for the big ones. Wobblers are the best bet with McMahon's wobbler most popular.

CRATER LAKE, still good for limits of small fish on trolling. **CAMPBELL LAKE**, for bait, trolling and flies. Fish run small but limits are in order.

PAULINA LAKE, mostly on flies, bait fishing with worms at the slide, trolling with 2-blade flashers.

All sections of the **NORTH FORK** of the Rogue and the small creeks and streams in and around the Natural Bridge and **UNION CREEK** have been good on flies and single eggs. Some small spinner fishing.

UMPUA RIVER in most all sections good on flies and bait. Some spinner fishing. Flies, however, are best.

WOOD RIVER and Seven Mile at the mouth or in the lake at the mouth of the above rivers has been good for some nice size fish on McMahon and jigger wobblers.

Be careful of fire and lighted material when in the woods.

CARLSTROM WHIFFS 10 GIVES 3 HITS

Clyde Carlstrom, righthanded pitching ace of the Dorris-Klamath Lumberjack baseball nine, struck out ten Big Lakes batters and allowed only three hits last night at Recreation park and led his team to a 12-2 victory over the Interwonderland league team in the first night contest ever staged in Klamath Falls.

Carlstrom retired three men in order in every inning except the first and fifth when the Big Lakes players scored their two runs. Virgil Horn, rightfielder, doubled off the Lumberjack hurler in the opening stanza and crossed the plate with the game's first tally when Lloyd, third baseman, muffed Carlstrom's throw to nail him on a steal. Second Baseman Welch posted the other Big Lakes marker in the fifth when Harold sent him home with a booming double to left centerfield.

The big guns of the Dorris-Klamath attack opened up on Pitcher Jack Mahoney of Big Lakes in the first frame by banging in six runs. However, much of the blame for the spurge goes to poor support by his teammates who erred three times. Two errors, a walk and a sacrifice filled the bases with only one away. Mahoney then fed Wheeler, Lumberjack shortstop, a pitch much to his liking and he slapped it over the left field fence for a homer to give his team a 4-1 lead.

Two more runs trickled home on Fryer's single, another Big Lakes' miscue, and Earl Brooks hit. Mahoney fanned Bob Anacker, rightfielder, for the third out of the disastrous first inning. Dorris-Klamath pushed in another run in the second on two walks and two more safeties.

After three scoreless innings the Lumberjack nine came to life once more in the sixth with a powerful attack that netted five tallies on six clean hits and the fourth Big Lakes error of the game. Four of the safe blows came in consecutive order as Anacker, Bernard, Eystone and Wheeler all garnered doubles. Carlstrom and Duracha collected the other two hits of the inning.

The winners smashed out 11 hits during the course of the melee with every man in the Lumberjack lineup except Lloyd getting at least one hit. Bernard, Duracha and Wheeler each had two base knocks to their credit. Horn, Welch and Harold Crapo nabbed the three hits off Pitcher Carlstrom of the victors.

In a preliminary tilt to the Big Lakes-Lumberjack tussle Postoffice's softball team won a hard-earned decision over Kalpine by coming from behind to eke out a 5-4 win. Kalpine took the lead with a four-run outburst in the second, but the let-

ter carriers were not to be denied. The Postmen came back with three runs in the fourth and another in the fifth to tie up the score and make things interesting. Meanwhile Rex Higbee, Postoffice twirler, who was pretty wild with his delivery in the early innings, settled down and retired the Kalpine batsmen in order in the last four frames.

In the last of the seventh Higbee and Vogel, first two batters, hit safely. Propst whiffed and Godbey was deliberately walked to fill the bases. The free pass seemed to be good strategy for the next man to face Lou Aiello, Kalpine pitcher, who was Dave White who went down swinging. However, Crayne hit a bounder to Bridge at third that the latter muffed to let the winning run come home.

HOSTAK 10-6 FAVORITE IN ZALE BATTLE

SEATTLE, July 19 (AP)—After an argument over the amount of hand bandages had been settled, everything—including the weather—was ready today for tonight's 15-round fight between Al Hostak of Seattle and Tony Zale of Gary, Ind., for the 46-state NBA middleweight championship.

Sam Pian, dapper co-manager of Zale, said the bandage argument had been settled amicably with state athletic commissioners, so all that now remains is for former Lightweight Champion Benny Leonard to call the boys to the center of the ring about 9 p. m. (PST) for their instructions, and then await the Gong.

"We don't object to five or ten yards of gauze on a fighter's hands," Pian explained, "but we don't want any tape or plaster of paris or that stuff so a fellow can punch his way through a brick wall. If this Hostak is such a puncher, okay, but why give him an iron mitt?"

Iddie Marino, Hostak's manager, disclaimed any desire to wrap the Seattle Slav's hands in anything but gauze, and scoffed at reports Al would bandage his hands heavily to protect his oft-broken hands.

"His hands are better than ever. He'll knock out that Zale. You wait and see," spoke Eddie. And so ended the last bit of pre-fight ballyhoo.

Hostak was a 10-6 favorite before his home town crowd. Promoter Nate Druzman said he expected some 17,000 persons would pay \$50.00 to see the scrap at the Civic Stadium field under predicted starlit skies. There will be no broadcast.

NEW YORK, July 19 (UP)—No evidence is needed to convince the New York Yankees that what their team needs is a heavy dose of Bill Dickey's old effectiveness and, while second-string catcher Buddy Rosar is rooting as hard as the rest for "Old Bill" to come back, his bat is doing an excellent job of nailing Dickey to the bench.

Thursday, the Yanks won their second straight over Cleveland, 9-6, dropping the tribe into second place. Rosar's hitting played a big part in the triumph. Along with Red Rolfe and Joe DiMaggio, Rosar clouted a four-bagger, but his came in the first inning with the bases loaded and sent the Yanks ahead to stay.

The first triple play of the season helped the Detroit Tigers climb back into first place in the American league with a 10-8 win over the Boston Red Sox. Pinky Higgins' single with the bases loaded in the 11th inning punched over the winning runs but the three-ply killing in which Charley Gehringer, Rudy York, Ralph Kress, Higgins and George Tebbetts all had a hand, featured the game.

Washington won its fifth straight by shading the Chicago White Sox, 5-4. Alex Carrasquel was credited with the victory. Ed Smith, Sox pitcher, forced home the deciding run by walking Rick Ferrell with the bases loaded in the eighth.

Exact Opposites
McShain is the exact opposite from Pilusso—extremely orthodox and quick to take advantage of every opportunity to do his opponent dirt. Pilusso never uses these tactics—but he has a system which generally brings mat foes around to his way of thinking. With Sonnenbergs and haymakers he batters the meaneast foes around the ring, and by so doing has gained a reputation hard to beat on the Pacific coast.

Wagner Meets Kenaston
The "natural" arrangements are not limited to the top bout, however, as in the semi-windup Promoter Lillard has bracketed that clever, hard-hitting Texan, George Wagner, with a former world champion as rough and dirty as they come—Sergeant Bob Kenaston of Gold Hill.

This bout should almost equal the headliner in every respect, offering a similar situation—a popular scientific grappler matched with a meanie.

Starting the special ladies' night program will be a bout bringing an old favorite—Otis Clingman of Amarillo, Tex., back to Klamath. He will be matched against Jimmie Goodrich, huge athlete from University of Notre Dame.

DOUGLAS—Diamond lake only fair but neighboring streams good. Loon and Tahkenth lakes good.
JOSEPHINE—Rogue river fishing relatively poor. Klamath's Crater lake excellent, offering best fishing in southern Oregon.

JACKSON—A few limit catches of trout and some steelhead taken from Rogue river. Fish lake still offering some sport. Most streams too low for good fishing.
