Sealed bids will be received by the Regional Forester, U. S. Forest Service, 760 Market Street, San Francisco, California, up to and including August 1, 1940, for all the live timber marked for cutting, and all merchantable dead timber located on an area embracing about 50,000 acres within Townships 43, 44, and 45 North, Range 8 and 9 East, M. D. M., Modoc National Forest, California, estimated to be 100,000 M feet b. m., more or less, of ponderosa pine timber. No bid will be considered of less than \$2.00 per M feet for merchantable timber, and of less than \$3.50 per M feet for material, unmerchantable because of size, to be taken at the option of the purchaser, and for material, unmerchantable because of defect, also optional, if charged for, but increases in the price bid for optional material will not be considered in making an award. In addition, the purchaser will be required to make deposits to cover the cost to the United States for fire hazard reduction work at the rate of 50c per M feet b. m., and to make deposits for reforestation and other silvicultural work on this sale area at the rate of 25c per M feet b. m., both such deposits to be on the basis of the actual scale of merchantable material. Stumpage rates to be adjusted every three years. \$5,000.00 must be deposited with each bid, to be applied on the purchase price, refunded or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to conditions of sale. The right to reject and all bids reserved. This will involve light selective cutting. PLANES TO BATTLE CUTWORM INROADS

ner Laundry properties in Langell valley. Arrangements for the aerial dusting may be made through the county agent's office.

A brief survey made by the county agent's office shows that the worms are working on the alfalfa crop from Fort Klamath to Malin. Heaviest infestations noted so far are in Fort Klamath and Langell valley seed fields, with serious numbers in the Henley district. A few fields examined east of Merrill and near Malin failed to show serious damage.

The worm hatches from an egg laid by a night-flying brown-

gray moth with a wingspread of 1 1/2 to two inches. They feed in the evening and at night and spend the day curled up on the ground under plants or trash. Damage is done when they eat young buds or cut off upper clover flowers. Since they feed mainly on the new growth and are now eating the flower and upper stems and leaves, heavy infestations may be detected by brown colored areas showing mainly ripening heads. Areas not having many worms show abundance of fresh top bloom and leaves. The brown areas show because the new blooms and upper leaves have been cut off. Such areas will show many upper stems with no heads.

These worms were serious in many parts of Oregon in 1925. A small infestation took place seven to 10 years ago on alfalfa on Tulelake.

E. A. Geary has dusted for worm control successfully.

Recommendations for dusting obtained by telephone from Don C. Mote, entomologist, Oregon State college, are a 20-pound per acre application of dusting mixture. The mixture recommendations are one-half calcium arsenate and one-half inert matter. The inert matter consists of half diatomaceous earth and half talc. The talc addition gives the dust somewhat more body, according to Dr. Mote, although the diatomaceous earth or the talc will work.

A successful dust mixture used by Geary was made up of two parts calcium arsenate to one part diatomaceous earth. Some study of the effect of this amount of arsenate on threshed straw for stock feed will need to be made before any is fed.

to avoid the dust drifting onto pastures nearby. In any case, where pastures are close to alfalfa fields, dusting should only be done where there is no wind to drift it toward pasture. There appears to be little, if any, danger from waste water moving out of a dusted field as most of the dust will cling to the clover.

Alfalfa growers are warned to check fields carefully for cutworm infestation. This may be done by separating the clover plants and removing trash so the curled up worms may be seen on the ground. If all the worms are as big around as a lead pencil, they will soon finish growth, probably within a week. If there are many half-grown worms, they will continue to work for possibly three or four weeks.

When worm numbers exceed three or four per square foot, they are likely to do serious damage, according to the county agents office, particularly if the worms are still small and will be eating for several more weeks.
