PORTLAND BANKER WARNS U. S. MUST KEEP PRINCIPLES

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., July 19 (UP)—The United States must find a way to preserve her democratic principles in view of the forthcoming "great increase in federal concentration of power," E. B. MacNaughton, president of the First National Bank of Portland, warned the delegates to the Stanford business conference yesterday.

"The problem," MacNaughton said, "is how to effect the increase of federal power concentration without falling into the morass of Germany, Russia and Italy."

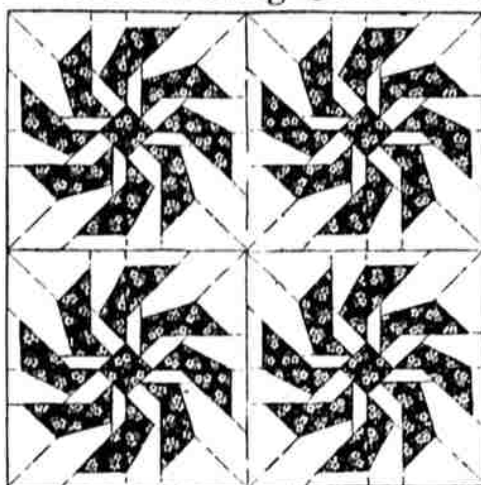
"We have come to a time when a great change in prospects for every one of us is due. Chamberlain pointed it out last October when he said 'Whatever the issue of this struggle, the world will never be the same again.'"

MacNaughton said the change will affect "our grandchildren" more than the present generation.

CCC CAMPS SLATED FOR OREGON AREAS

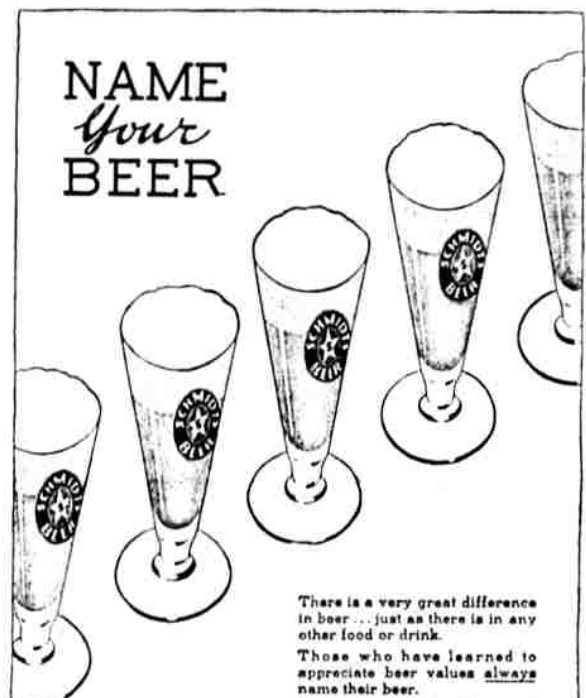
WASHINGTON, July 19 (AP)—Oregon's conservation program will provide employment through the civilian conservation corps for 2000 Oregon young men, 194 war veterans and 9006 men from other states

in the quarter-year ending September 30.

James J. McEntee, director of the CCC, in announcing the figures today said 56 camps would operate in this first quarter of the new fiscal year.

Of the 11,200 enrollees to be employed in Oregon, 5290 will work on forest improvement, development and protection, 1800 on range rehabilitation, 1200 on reclamation projects, 1000 under the supervision of the general land office, 800 on erosion control on agricultural
