

## SHASTA COUNTY POPULATIONS UP IN DECADE

The nine counties comprising the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland of northern California and southern Oregon did better in population gains during the past ten years than the average for the two states of which they are a part, according to the figures released by the census supervisors for those states. With a combined gain of 23 per cent for that period, the nine counties rolled up a score of 34,460 new citizens to gain more than the total population of its largest county in 1930.

In 1930 the census showed the combined nine counties had population of 146,867, while the supervisors show the total for 1940 to be 183,327. The five counties to make the largest gains in the order named are Shasta, Klamath, Siskiyou, Jackson and Lassen. The highest gains by percentages were made by the counties in the order named, Shasta, Trinity, Lake, Klamath and Lassen.

This new roster of new citizens, equal to more than the entire county of Klamath as it was in 1930, is considered as outstanding in view of the economic situation and gives one a graphic idea of the growth of this region which is just getting underway in utilizing its vast natural resources.

The following table gives the new population of each Shasta-Cascade county and the gain made by each county.

## Cooking for Two Takes Planning on Part of Bride

The small or individual casserole is a friend of the June bride who has to cook for two, and make that cooking taste "just like mother's." Casseroles in small sizes give small quantities of food a substantial appearance, yet at the same time offer them in an attractive and dainty manner.

There are so many childless couples in the United States, and so many young-marrieds, that cooking for two is an important phase of our national housekeeping. When not using casserole dishes, the meat for two should be selected from chops, kidneys, liver, fowl, small-cut steaks, and cutlets.

The recipes given below are for two persons. They are particularly good for light summer housekeeping. Canned soups are easy to keep on hand. Left over meats are always with us.

### Chicken Pie

(Serves 2)

Two tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 can condensed chicken soup, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup cooked chicken, 1/2 cup peas and carrots, cooked, 1/2 teaspoon salt, pinch of pepper.

Melt the butter in a saucepan, add flour and cook until

frothy. Then add the condensed chicken soup and the milk and cook until thickened.

Combine cooked chicken, carrots, peas, and seasonings with the sauce. Put into a small casserole or individual pie dishes.

Cover with biscuit crust, mashed potato cover or crackers top. Put into a hot oven (400 degrees F.) for 10 to 15 minutes.

### Shepherd's Beef Pie

(Serves 2)

Three-fourths cup cooked beef, diced, 1/2 cup beef gravy, 1 can condensed beef soup, 1 1/2 cups hot mashed potatoes.

Combine the beef soup, cooked beef gravy. Heat all and put into a small casserole. Cover with a layer of mashed potatoes and bake in a hot oven (425 degrees F.) for about 15 minutes, or brown the potato under the broiler.

### Menu

Breakfast: Stewed apricots, Sally Lunn muffins, cherry jam, coffee, milk.

Luncheon: Chicken pie, celery, hard rolls, sliced peaches, tea, milk.

Dinner: Iced cantaloupe, Shepherd's beef pie, grilled tomatoes, peas with mint, lettuce and green pepper salad, pineapple bavarian cream, coffee, milk.

## WAR OVER, SAYS HARVARD SOLON

PALO ALTO, Calif., July 19 (AP)—"The war is over, in my opinion," Dr. J. Franklin Ebersole, of Harvard university, told the Stanford business conference Thursday, "but we will go on arming feverishly for years just the same."

The economist implied a belief that a deadlock in the European battle would force Hitler and Britain to get together and work out a compromise.

"It is the same situation as our foreign debts," he asserted. "They were repudiated five years before we recognized it." Ebersole told some 200 business executives at the fourth session of the week-long conference that the nation should be thinking of what the world will need when fighting is over and begin working to that end.

Instead, he forecast the country would work furiously on armament, conscript and equip a large fighting force, put capital issues under government control, pour government money into plant construction, adopt consumption controls, restrict imports and set up price-fixing in various forms.

## PARI-MUTUEL HORSE RACING MAY START HERE

The possibility of starting pari-mutuel horse racing at the Klamath county fairgrounds this fall was tentatively discussed by members of the county fair board Thursday, in a meeting with the county court. No definite action has been taken, but the board has been approached on the matter by interested parties and further developments may come later, it was stated.
