

# WILLAMETTE GETS THROUGH ROAD STATUS

The Klamath county court on Thursday received a resolution from the state highway commission declaring the new Willamette highway a through highway and designating all intersecting county and other side roads as "stop" roads upon entering the Willamette highway.

By reason of the highway's connections with the Pacific highway and The Dalles-California highway, it is a road of primary importance, the resolution states.

The new highway will be finally opened to travel in a big public ceremony at the east portal of the summit tunnel on July 30. State officials, civic representatives, federal and state highway authorities, and many citizens are expected to attend the opening.

The Willamette highway, when completed, will be a part of a coastwise motor route, shortening the distance from Willamette valley points to California points. The distance from Eugene to Klamath Falls will then be 180 miles.

Much travel that now goes by way of the Pacific highway through the Rogue river and Umpqua valleys is expected to take the faster, shorter route over the Willamette pass via Klamath Falls and Weed.

## ITINERANT MOTHER LEAVES BABY ON SPEEDING FREIGHT

EL PASO, Tex., July 19 (AP)—A six-month-old baby rode 60 miles in a box car after his frantic young mother tried in vain to board the freight train after placing him aboard, it was learned yesterday.

Deputy sheriffs were attempting to locate the mother, Mrs. Lorraine Adair, 20, who had placed the infant on the east-bound train at Fabens, Tex., 40 miles east of here, yesterday. With the intention of immediately climbing on with her sister, Evelyn Dyer, 16.

Weldon Call, an itinerant, said the train moved slowly when the baby was placed in the open box car, but that neither woman was able to crawl aboard as it gathered speed.

Call said he attended the infant until the train stopped at Sierra Blanca, 60 miles east of Fabens, and then took him to the Hudspeth county sheriff's office and departed. Officers wired back to Fabens but learned that the mother, after tearfully telling of the incident, had left in search of the child.

## 15,000 U. S. PLEAS FOR CANADA AIR SERVICE RECEIVED

OTTAWA, Ont., July 19 (UP)—A royal Canadian air force official said yesterday "at least" 15,000 United States citizens had applied for air force membership.

The official said an accurate estimate was difficult because many of the applicants had appeared personally at the 30 Canadian recruiting stations. He said 7250 applications had been received by mail up to June 30. Personal applications, he said, were "greatly in excess of that figure."

## ARMY ENLISTMENT ADVANTAGES GIVEN

Advantages of enlistment in the United States army for young men seeking interesting careers and valuable training for civilian jobs later on were enumerated in an announcement from the Klamath Falls U. S. army recruiting station, recently established at the federal building.

Second Lieut. Donald Marcy, Inf. Res., sub-station commander, announced that men who enlist will receive eleven months' training at service schools in such fields as: aviation mechanics, sheet metal working, stenography, male nursing, x-ray work, piloting, photography, surveying, and many others.

Upon completion of this course the enrollee receives a certificate of capacity, which is invaluable as a recommendation for civilian jobs. Salaries range from \$21 per month to \$157.60 per month, with retirement after 30 years at three-fourths pay. Enrollees also receive uniform allowance, living quarters, rations, and medical and dental care. Besides this, facilities for entertainment and sports activities are furnished.

## ARMY SEEKING SUPPLIES FOR ANCHORAGE BASE

PALMER, Alaska, July 19 (AP)—Maj. Gen. Henry H. Arnold, chief of the army air corps, told farmers of the Matanuska valley yesterday the army would need enough produce to supply 5000 men at its new air base at Anchorage next year.

Arnold said that if the valley was unable to supply the demand the army might be forced to go into farming itself. He said the American soldier had always been well fed and this would continue in Alaska even if the soldiers had to raise their own produce.

He was impressed with the possibilities of the farm colony established by the federal government several years ago.

Gen. Arnold and his staff reached Spokane, Wash., last night on their return from an aerial tour of Alaska.

## CREWS BATTLE M'KENZIE BLAZE

EUGENE, July 18 (AP)—More than 130 confident fire fighters today battled a timber blaze which has blackened 300 acres near the scenic McKenzie River highway 42 miles east of here near Vida. They expect to control it tonight.

Rangers, NYA youths, fire guards and loggers have been working desperately since yesterday to throw a trail around the area. Willamette forest officials said the blaze, discovered early yesterday morning racing up a ridge between the Callapooya and McKenzie river valleys, spread from an unattended campfire.

Independent store sales in Klamath Falls were 5.7 per cent higher in June, 1940, than in the same month of 1939, according to a report from the census bureau.

In Oregon as a whole the gain was 9 per cent. Of the several kinds of business covered by the survey, food stores showed a gain of 1.6 per cent; apparel stores, 9.4 per cent; motor vehicle dealers, 22.9 per cent; furniture, 10.3 per cent; lumber-building hardware group, 5.8 per cent.

# DRAFT FAIR, NATION TOLD BY PRESIDENT

WASHINGTON July 19 (AP)—Here is the text of that portion of President Roosevelt's acceptance speech dealing with selective service.

"Just as a system of national defense based on manpower alone, without the mechanized equipment of modern warfare is totally insufficient for adequate defense, so also planes and guns and tanks are wholly insufficient unless they are implemented by the power of men trained to use them.

"Such manpower consists not only of pilots and gunners and infantry and those who operate tanks. For every individual in actual combat service, it is necessary for adequate defense that we have ready at hand at least four or five other trained individuals organized for non-combat service.

"Because of the millions of citizens involved in the conduct of defense, most right thinking persons are agreed that some form of selection by draft is as necessary and as fair today as it was in 1917 and 1918.

"Nearly every American is willing to do his share or her share to defend the United States. It is neither just nor efficient to permit the task to fall upon any one section or any one

# Claimants to Be Informed of Social Security Insurance

Plans for getting in touch with claimants who may now be entitled to monthly insurance payments under the federal social security act were announced today by Wesley Hayes, manager of the Klamath Falls office of the social security board, who has returned from a regional conference of social security officials in San Francisco. Hayes said special attention will be given to informing the widows and surviving children of insured workers who have died since last January 1 of the insurance payments now provided by the act.

"This is a new feature of the law," Hayes said, "and some families may not be informed of their rights. Several of these claims by the surviving widow and children of the deceased worker have already been filed with the Klamath Falls office, but we are anxious that no one entitled to these payments will be overlooked."

Hayes reported that employers have in many instances been helpful in informing the survivors of a former employee of their rights and directed them to his office. Labor union officials were also said to be helpful in advising their members of the new provisions of the law. Monthly insurance payments will be made, it was explained, if the worker died this year.
