

ANTI-WALLACE KNOCKS HEARD INSIDE RANKS

chairman is publisher, announced its support today of Wendell L. Willkie, republican presidential nominee.

McCormick was democratic candidate for governor in 1934 and chairman of the democratic national committee in 1916 during President Wilson's campaign for a second term.

The Patriot said in an editorial it was "sorry" it could not support President Roosevelt, whose nomination, it said, "breaks the third term tradition as well as the hearts of millions of democrats who had hoped the dangerous and un-economic policies of the new deal would be repudiated and the party rededicated to its fundamental principles."

KANSAS CITY, July 20 (AP) — James A. Reed said today the group of anti-Roosevelt third termers he had summoned to Chicago next Thursday were committee members of the National Jeffersonian Democrats, which he organized to oppose the president's reelection in 1936.

"I have simply issued a call for the members of that committee, numbering five or six, to see what ought to be done," the 78-year-old former senator said. He did not announce names of those he had invited. Reed indicated efforts would be made to organize anti-third termers and anti-new dealers on a nationwide basis, but said "just what course will be pursued will be decided" at the Chicago meeting.

NEW ORLEANS, La., July 20 (AP) — A spokesman for Louisiana's \$150,000,000 sugar industry joined the state's national democratic delegates and its "reform" governor today in a revolt against Secretary Wallace as the democratic vice presidential candidate.

Charles A. Farwell, spokesman for the American Sugar Cane League and a lifelong democrat, pinned on a "Willkie For President" button, protesting that Wallace did "fall in his power to destroy" the sugar industry. He declared the "re-

publicans are Louisiana sugar's only hope."

The state's delegation to the national democratic convention deserted Wallace because of the agricultural secretary's sugar quota restriction program and plow-up campaign. They cast their 20 votes for Speaker Bankhead.

One of the delegates, John Caffery of St. Mary parish, announced he would vote for Willkie. At the same time Governor Sam Jones declared he was against Wallace "1000 per cent."

In southeast England, four German airmen, one of them wounded, were taken prisoner when their bullet-shattered craft fluttered to earth.

Appeal Ignored — Defense forces battered raiders over southwest England, Wales and southeast Scotland. A lone nazi bomber let go three bombs over a northeast Scottish coastal town, badly damaging a school.

Meantime Britain ignored Hitler's "final appeal" for peace on his own terms and indicated she is ready for a test of strength.

Raiders at Large — The British navy was confronted with a new problem when it was announced that a German sea raider is "at large in the Atlantic" after sinking two British merchant ships—the 5220-ton St. John and 6433-ton Davian—near the West Indies.

The raider was believed by the admiralty to be a converted merchantman.

HUGE DEFENSE BILL SIGNED; NAVY PUSHED

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the previously authorized maximum. If the president deems them necessary even more may be ordered.

To expedite the construction of the mammoth fleet, the new act authorizes an appropriation of \$150,000,000 for essential equipment and facilities at either private or naval shipyards, an additional \$65,000,000 for expansion of facilities for the production of ordnance and munitions at either government or private factories and \$35,000,000 to expand the nation's limited armor-making plants.

Besides the 200 combat ships, the law also authorizes construction or conversion of 100,000 tons of auxiliary vessels such as tankers, seaplane tenders and repair ships, and a \$50,000,000 fleet of small patrol and escort vessels and motor torpedo boats.

The huge armada, with greater range and striking power than any other in the world's history, was designed to enable the navy to meet attacks in the Atlantic and Pacific at the same time, if necessary, and to meet the enemy 1000 miles or more from this country's shores.

The new law authorizes a 70 per cent expansion of the fleet which would add 1,325,000 tons of combatant ships to the navy. For reasons of military secrecy, the exact number of each type of ship in the new program was not disclosed.

CHARGES MAY BE FILED IN JACKSON CASE

Return of U. S. Commissioner Bert C. Thomas to the city next week will probably be followed by the filing of federal charges in the shooting of Annabel Jackson, 18-year-old Klamath Indian girl, it was learned Saturday.

Indications are that assault charges will be filed against Eva Olson, 27, white woman said to be at the Harry Jackson house near Chilquin when the girl was shot. Eva Olson, her husband, Gordon, and Reed Edward Moline, are in the county jail as federal prisoners in connection with the case.

Indian Officer John Arkell is still investigating circumstances of the shooting. It was learned that the officers believe Mrs. Olson was in a room with Miss Jackson at or about the time the girl was shot with a .22 rifle. Miss Jackson was snort in the brain, but is given a good chance of recovery.

ROBBERY CASES PROBED BY POLICE

City police are working on two break and enter cases in which property was stolen Thursday night from two Klamath Falls business houses, it was revealed Saturday by Police Chief Frank Hamm.

Entering through a window, robbers made their way inside the Reed Tractor company, 719 Market street, some time Thursday night, and attempted to crack the safe. With tools apparently taken from a nearby tool chest, the burglars pried a knob from the safe but were unsuccessful in getting inside the strongbox. Then turning to a Coca-Cola dispenser, they pried the top off, drank three cokes and filched \$1 in change from the machine.

In the other case burglars gained entrance to Poole's Roller-drome Thursday night, breaking the screen and glass from a window. The cash register was empty, but the burglars wrecked a cigarette dispenser and made off with a number of packages of cigarettes.
