Miss Houston Becomes Bride of Mr. Tillotson, July 13

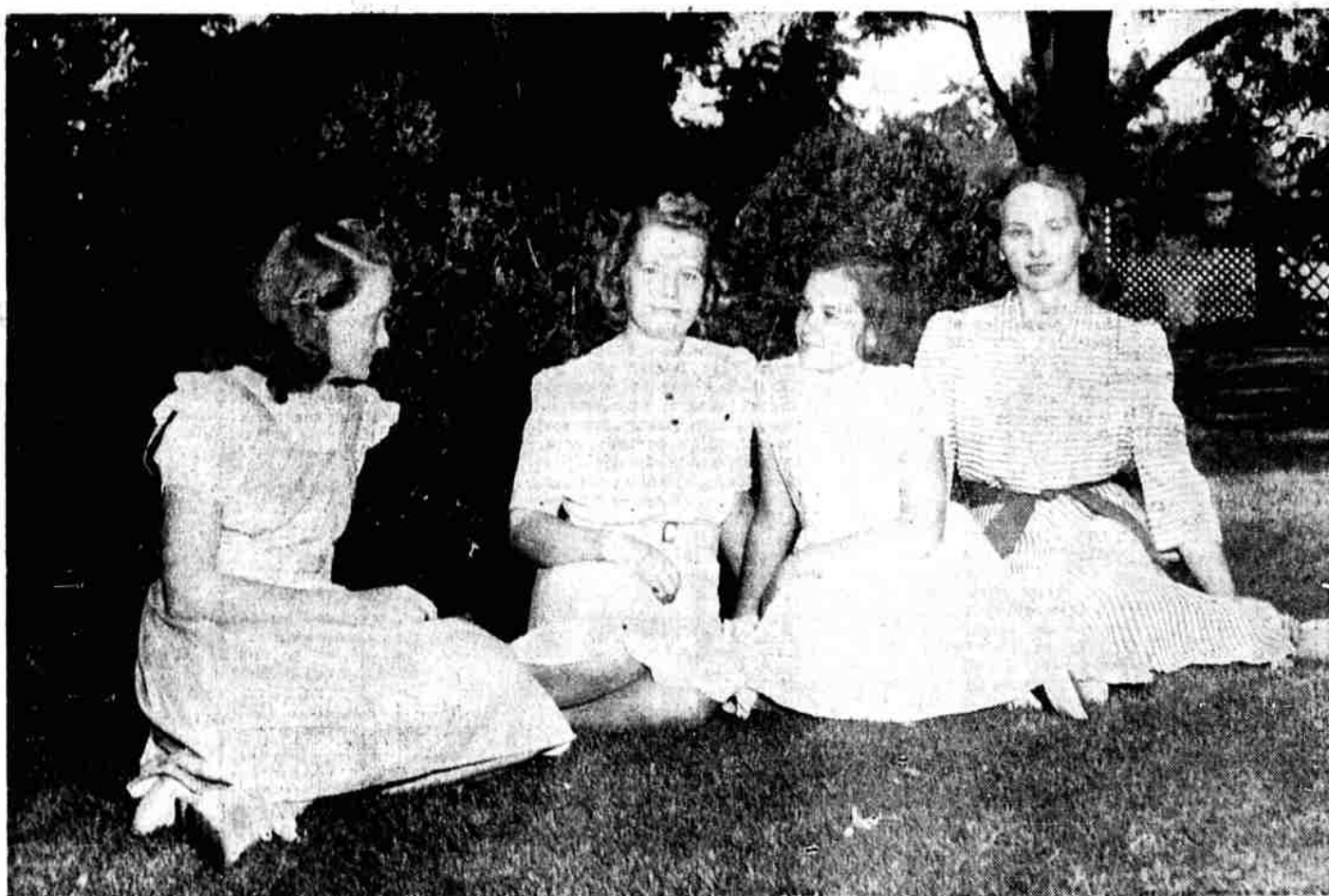
