JULY OFFERS TOURIST AMPLE EVENTS, FETES

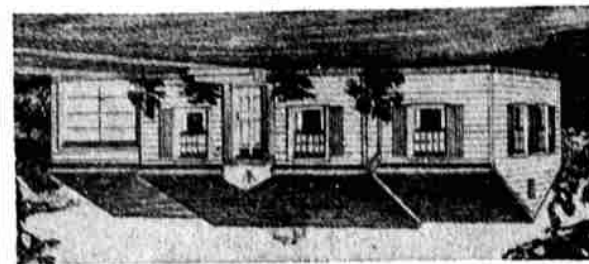

The silver lining in recent news from the national capital is the latest reports on mortgages selected by the federal housing administration for appraisal during the first 24 days of June, according to W. C. Bell, chairman of western homes foundation. These reports show, he says, a vital recovery from the sharp drop in May to reopen bright prospects of a banner home-building year for 1940.

"Mortgages selected for appraisal from January 1 to June 24 total 101,646, compared with 82,600 for same period in 1939," Bell says. "The week ending June 24 saw 4920 new homes started under FHA inspection, the largest number in any week since FHA started operations. Could anything more strongly represent the faith of the average American family in the permanent values of the ownership of house and land, of a true home, and a related faith in the power of this country to defend its people and their homes?"

"The force of this faith is something as modern as the mechanized forces of warfare. It is embodied in the insured amortized home loan, which has been made a national institution by the federal housing administration and the banks and other financing concerns allied with government agencies.

"But it is also the force of a living spirit that is as modern as it is American. One may see this in its most dramatic form in the home-going parade of wage-earners in any large industrial center. This spectacle, whether seen in New York, Detroit or Seattle, is a wonder of the world to visiting Europeans.

"The modern automobile and highway have opened the way to escape from congested urban neighborhoods for millions of industrial employees. Their daily home-going has become the biggest parade on earth—and the happiest one.

"It could not have come into being without the modern services of the building industry and modern home financing. More house for the dollar is



now being provided the new home buyer than ever before, while more of this dollar goes into building industry wages. Index numbers of material prices and union wages, 1921 to 1938, just published by the department of labor, using 1921 as 100 give a figure of 92.7 on building materials that may be economically applied, power tools, and more efficient organization of the industry, have operated to reduce home-building costs despite wage rises. At the same time, the cost of home financing has been reduced on the average of 20 per cent and more while being made more safe.

"Such are a few of the factors of the modern big parade of American home-goers at the end of the work-day.
