OREGON MAY GET FOURTH DISTRICT

PORTLAND, July 22 (AP)—Oregon's population increase to 1,085,517 during the past decade may give the state a fourth congressional district.

Political observers said that if congress does not decrease the ratio of representatives to population Oregon might be divided as follows:

First district, Clatsop, Columbia, Tillamook, Washington, Yamhill, Clackamas, Polk, Marion and Multnomah east of 122nd avenue (population 299,297).

Second — Baker, Crook, Deschutes, Gilliam, Grant, Harney, Hood River, Jefferson, Klamath, Lake, Malheur, Morrow, Sherman, Umatilla, Union, Wallowa, Wasco and Wheeler. (District same as at present, population 208,796).

Third — Multnomah west of 122nd avenue (population 330,436).

Fourth — Lincoln, Benton, Linn, Lane, Douglas, Coos, Curry, Josephine and Jackson (population 246,988).

Among the New Books

At the City Library

NIGHT IN BOMBAY by LOUIS BROMFIELD — The heterogeneous and sophisticated society of Bombay is the background of this book. Into this society comes Bill Wainwright, a reformer playboy, on a business trip for his father. Here he meets his former wife, Carol Halma, a beautiful ex-dancer, and Buck Merrill, a college friend doing welfare work in the district beyond the city. That Mr. Bromfield is a good story teller there can be no doubt. Any one who can somehow make a readable tale out of this phony collection of impossible events, is a master. It is all gloss and a yard wide, and it offers you a quick and easy way of learning nothing about India. The characters are all as overdrawn as those in a fairy tale, and all of them would be readily understood by any nine year old who hasn't led too sheltered a life. But Mr. Bromfield's direction is superb and though the feeling displayed is second rate, the craftsmanship is undeniably first rate.

LAND WITHOUT LAUGHTER by AHMAD KAMAL — A Moslem of Tatar stock, Ahmad Kamal was born in America, and in 1935 realized his life-long dream of a pilgrimage to the land of his fathers. Journey through the Karakoram into Turkistan, he found the territory in which he arrived in revolt against the soviet rule and joined the bandit general Ma Hsi Jung in his guerrilla campaign. Later, he was arrested by soviet authorities, and narrowly escaping the execution that befell his companions, he fled into Mongolia and through the Gobi. This is really top-notch travel adventure. Perhaps it's not all too accurate, and quite likely the color has been laid on a little too heavily here and there. It is a swashbuckly and boastful account, but that's not offensive, and it does make an already exciting novel and daring adventure seem even more exciting. In spite of its slight incredibility, it's well worth reading.

THIS SIDE OF GLORY by MRS. GWEN BRISTOW — This is the third in a series of Louisiana novels, of which the aristocratic Larnes and the plebeian Upjohns are the chief characters. The two preceding books are Deep Summer and Handsome Road, which, though they are worth reading are not necessary to the understanding of this third volume. In this story the Upjohns have become affluent and respected in the community, but there is no denying their background (which was definitely steered). The Larnes are living in graceful poverty, on the verge of bankruptcy. When Kester Larnes marries Eleanor Upjohn, against the advice of both families, the stage is set for a long struggle, which ends (naturally) in a lasting understanding between the two. People who read for entertainment only ought to love this book. On the other hand, there is some inspiration in the book, and it is not dull at all. Both of the principle

characters are a little obvious, but even so it's a pretty good story.

THE BLOODY MOHAWK by THOMAS CLARKE — Maintaining that the Mohawk valley and the Iroquois living there held the key to English westward expansion, the author has written this history of the valley up to the end of the revolution. The book is a popular history and goes beyond the confines of the Mohawk valley to include the stories of some of the border wars of the time. There is considerable competence shown in this book. Mr. Clark has picked his way carefully among conflicting sources, French and English, story and patriot, in a real endeavor to write an unbiased history. He has studied his subject thoroughly, and told it well. This is good upstate New York lore which should have considerable appeal for those interested in Americana. It doesn't sound very exciting, but as a matter of fact it's not likely to bore you, and is certain to edify you.

EUROPE'S WHEAT BELOW AVERAGE

CHICAGO, July 22 (AP)—More reliable information leaking through Europe's censorship ship wall this week confirmed grain trade reports that the continent's wartime wheat crop is substantially below the 1,640,000,000 bushel average of recent seasons.

On the basis of data coming largely through Broomhall, British trade authority, and Canadian and United States government sources, traders estimated losses range up to more than 33 per cent compared with last year's big harvest in some localities. The average loss was estimated at 25 per cent. This would place the crop about 10 per cent below average of recent years.

Whether this deficiency is to be satisfied by increased imports or whether Europe is to tighten its belt even more in the face of possible famine in some regions will depend upon the course of the war which has shut off most of the normal traffic in grain imported by Europe, trade experts said today.

"What a travesty this is," Richard Uhlmann, Chicago grain authority, pointed out, "with the world's wheat carryover the largest in history. Unfavorable weather and mobilization of peasant labor have had their effect."

Ordinarily continental Europe annually imports about 150,000,000 bushels of wheat from overseas in addition to more than 2,000,000 bushels of flour, 140,000,000 bushels of corn, 24,000,000 bushels of barley and 35,000,000 bushels of oats.

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STOCK MARKET IN 'COMATOSE' STATE MONDAY

NEW YORK, July 22 (AP)—Stocks generally remained in a comatose condition today with war influences again receiving principal blame for the apathy.

A feeble try at recovery was made by stocks but even these never got far out in front.

With dealings inconsequential throughout, transfers for five hours were around 225,000 shares, one of the smallest turn-overs for a full session since 1918.

A feature of the listless proceedings was the sale of a 20,000-share block of Kennecott at a loss of only 1 from a previous transaction. This transfer, rumored to have been from Canadian account, originally was said to have been intended for a private deal. In similar trades off the "big board" the seller has conceded as much as 1 to 1 full point.

'HOME GUARD' EYED IF GUARD IS MOBILIZED

SALEM, July 22 (AP)—The state of Oregon moved Saturday to provide a "home guard" militia to replace the national guard if the latter is mobilized, and to assure national guardsmen that their jobs in private industry will await them after demobilization.

Gov. Charles A. Sprague said plans for a home guard have been drafted by Maj. Gen. George A. White of the 41st division, but emphasized that the organization would be completed "only after we are satisfied that there is a genuine need for it."

He said such a group would be much smaller than the national guard, that military training would be left to the federal government, and that it would not be expensive. He pointed out that the existence of a militia less necessary than during the years after the World war.

Gen. White's other plan would have employers sign agreements to hold national guardsmen's jobs for them during such time as they are in active service. He said "experience in four past mobilizations convinces me that oral promises sometimes are valueless."

"It is necessary to avoid the unfortunate condition that followed demobilization in 1918-19," White said, "when over 900,000 returned soldiers were walking the streets of the United States looking for jobs."
