LONDON, July 22 (AP)—An Exchange Telegraph (British news agency) report from Goteborg quoted Swedish sources today as saying that Karl Ulmanis, former president of Latvia, was gravely wounded and in a hospital at Riga.

BUCHAREST, July 22 (AP)—Rumania's newly won pledges of support from the Rome-Berlin axis are about to receive their first test, it was reported here today, as a result of a note from Moscow emphasizing Russian interest in a "popular government" for King Carol's monarchy.

Authoritative Rumanians said the soviet note was received Saturday and that yesterday Rumanian Foreign Minister Mihail Manolescu met with the German and Italian ministers at a resort on the Black sea.

Defense Discussed
King Carol, shortly after receipt of the note, was said to have met with Vice Premier Gen. Mihail Ionescu, War Minister Gen. Constantine Nicolescu and Chief of Staff Florea Tyneanu.

Observers assumed here they discussed the new Rumanian defense system in the east, set up since Russian occupation of northern Bucovina and Bessarabia June 28.

These sources said Premier Ion Gligur's pro-nazi government was advised by Moscow that Russia wished to improve her relations with Rumania and felt this could be accomplished by formation of a "popular government."

Meanwhile Bucharest newspapers carried reports that the Moscow radio, after numerous attacks on Rumania, suddenly had swung to support of Rumania in her territorial dispute with Hungary over Transylvania.

(In Tarnovo, Bulgaria, Premier Bogdan Philoff announced yesterday that Bulgaria hoped to realize her territorial claims, which include part of the Rumanian province of Dobruja. "Not by war or arms but by peaceful means and through accord.")

HULL OFFERS TRUSTEE PLAN FOR COLONIES

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a position to move rapidly and without hesitation.

Endorses Plan
"It has been suggested," Hull declared, "that our action take the form of the establishment of a collective trusteeship, to be exercised in the name of all of the American republics. The government of the United States endorses this suggestion and is prepared to cooperate, should the occasion arise, in its execution."

He cautioned at the same time that such a plan "must not carry with it any thought of the creation of a special interest by any American republic."

All Nations
"Its purpose," he said, "must be to further the interests and security of all of the American nations, as well as the interest of the region in question."

"Moreover," he said, "as soon as conditions permit, the region should be restored to its original sovereign or be declared independent when able to establish and maintain stable self-government."

His endorsement of a proposal originally made by Cuba constituted a further warning to Germany and Italy—already made in a formal note—that any attempt to acquire French, Dutch or British colonies in this hemisphere would be resisted first by the United States and, if supported by the other American nations, would lead immediately to the establishment of a collective trusteeship over threatened territory.

ANDREWS GETS HIGH POST IN FARM BUREAU

Russell P. Andrews, former dean of boys at Klamath Union high school, has been given a key government position in Washington, D. C., with the agricultural department as associate administrative analyst in the budget and finance office.

This word was received Monday from Rocky Mountain National park, where Andrews has served the last two years in an administrative capacity with Superintendent David Canfield, formerly superintendent of Crater lake park.

Andrews came to Klamath Falls in 1930, and served five years as dean of boys at the high school. He also served five summer seasons as park ranger, and then served the park service at the Statue of Liberty National monument. Later he was with the national youth administration at Portland. Through a Rockefeller scholarship in 1937 he made a thorough study of public administration which led to his present important promotion.

Mr. and Mrs. Andrews will make their home temporarily at 7007 Curtis street, Chevy Chase, Maryland.

The Andrews have many friends in Klamath Falls and at Crater lake. The good news of Andrews' appointment was sent to The News and Herald by Superintendent Canfield and Ernest Rostel, the latter now handling publicity for Rocky Mountain park but formerly holding that position in the Crater lake administration.

BRITAIN WILL NEVER YIELD, MINISTER SAYS

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Germany, caused some damage." Britons warned to the fight of H.M.S. 1380-ton destroyer Brazen, which shot down three attacking planes even as she settled in the water to sink from a bomb explosion.

Prominent British announcement dealt with the asserted rout of 80 German planes — 40 bombers and 40 fighters — by six British Hurricane planes in an hour and 15 minute battle over the English channel Sunday afternoon. The British said one German plane was shot down and the others raced for home, their attack on a merchant shipping convoy thwarted.

German bombers killed at least 15 persons in widely scattered districts of Britain Sunday, however.

The British acknowledged loss of 11 planes in raids Saturday night on the German naval base at Wilhelmshaven and other objectives.

The Germans admitted loss of five planes Saturday but said the British lost 22.

The Italian high command, barking back once more to the Italian British naval battles in the Mediterranean, July 8-13, insisted it now has "positive information" that three British warships — in addition to the 42,100-ton battle cruiser Hood and the aircraft carrier Ark Royal — were "damaged severely" and suffered "heavy crew losses."

The British admiralty has officially denied any such casualties, either to ships or men.

As a token of "axis friendship," Hitler presented Premier Mussolini an armored train to protect him from air attacks in his travels.

PORTLAND, July 22 (UP)—Gyro International, northwest youth organization, Friday adopted a strong worded resolution denouncing "fifth column" activities and advocating stronger bonds between chapters in Canada and the United States.
