Moe Annenberg Begins Term

CHICAGO, July 23 (UP)—Moses Louis Annenberg, 64, an immigrant newsboy who became one of America's richest men as publisher of horse racing information, surrendered secretly to federal authorities yesterday and began a three-year term for income tax evasion.

Annenberg had arrived from his Philadelphia home, accompanied by his son, Walter. While newspapermen and photographers awaited them at federal court, they went to the office of Whitney Campbell, an attorney, and met U. S. Marshall William McDonnell.

Annenberg's sentence began officially at 9 a. m. (PST) and McDonnell and Deputy Joseph Thinnies left immediately with Annenberg by automobile for Lewisburg, Pa., where Annenberg will be confined in the federal penitentiary there. He will be eligible for parole in 11 months. With maximum time off for good behavior he will complete his sentence in two years and 113 days.

BRITISH EXPORTS DROP 20 PER CENT

LONDON, July 23 (UP)—British exports dropped 20 per cent in June, the board of trade reported last night, reflecting the intensification of the war and the spread of unrest throughout Europe.

The board returns showed exports for the month valued at \$6,211,000 pounds, compared with 45,450,000 for May and 39,895,000 a year ago. (The pound is officially pegged at \$4.04 on sales and \$4.02 on purchases). The board said that exports to the United States, South America, South Africa and Australia maintained the high level of the preceding three months.

YOUNGSTERS PLAN ANTI-HITLER BLAST

PORTLAND, July 23 (AP)—A group of youngsters led by six-year-old Bobby Benson started a poster campaign against Hitler in West Portland yesterday. Explaining they intended to post "Stop Hitler" signs throughout the district for a month, Master Benson said "I never even liked Hitler when I was a baby."

BRITISH MOTHER HELD FOR RUMORS

GLASGOW, July 23 (AP)—Mrs. Matilda Forsyth, 47, a mother, was sentenced to 21 days imprisonment today after she admitted she had made these statements about the war: That the Germans had landed in southern England and destroyed the docks, and that President Roosevelt had sent a ship to remove Britain's poor children to safety, but that it had been monopolized by persons such as Alfred Duff Cooper, minister of information.

Christian Science

"Life" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, July 21.

The Golden Text was, "This is life eternal, that they might know thee the only true God, and Jesus Christ, whom thou hast sent" (John 17:3). Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "The Lord is my strength and song, and has become my salvation. I shall not die, but live, and declare the works of the Lord. The righteousness of thy testimonies is everlasting: give me understanding, and I shall live" (Ps. 118, 119).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following correlative passages from "Christian Science and Health" by Mary Baker Eddy: "If it is true that man lives, this fact can never change in Science to the opposite belief that man dies. ZELLERBACH NET FOR YEAR BIGGEST IN HISTORY

WASHINGTON, July 23 (AP)—Electrocution of athletes' foot was described Monday in a report in the military surgery department.

Captain S. Hoechstetter, reserve medical officer at the Dwight, Ill., Veterans' hospital, said particles of copper atoms can be driven deep into the body tissues with weak electric currents to destroy the fungus growths which cause athlete's foot and other skin infections.

The idea is not new but Dr. Hoechstetter devised a simple machine which any doctor can have built by a radio repair man for about \$20. The device is attached to a pan filled with copper sulphate solution. The patient stands in the solution while only ten millionths of an ampere of electric current flows between the two electrodes. The current cannot be felt. The copper penetrates to the fungus growth below the surface in contrast to treatments which merely kill it on the surface and leave the underlying infection still growing.

TWO FIRES HIT PORTLAND STORES

PORTLAND, July 23 (AP)—Two fires caused approximately \$36,000 damages in Portland yesterday.

A three-alarm blaze created \$30,000 loss at the Bryte clothing store and injured fire department Capt. Ernest R. Greenfell. Falling glass cut his right hand.

Another fire damaged an east-side grocery store and adjacent jewelry shop to the extent of \$6500. Fire investigator William Goertz said.

VATICAN PRAISES MARSHAL PETAIN

VATICAN CITY, July 23 (AP)—Praise in the Vatican newspaper, L'Osservatore Romano, recently for "Good Marshal" Philippe Petain, chief of the new French state, attracted the attention of diplomats here in view of the Vatican's previous attitude toward totalitarian regimes.

Vatican authorities decline to comment on the newspaper's observations, which included a statement that "the principle of authority" is higher than "the human will," which is "intolerant of restrictions and has attempted to overstep all limits, first with criticism and then with revolution."

Foreign circles considered this passage a reference to social-political questions. (German foreign office circles expressed marked satisfaction today over what they regarded as a complete about-face by the Vatican in its position toward totalitarian states.)

Red Tape Cutting Key To Stettinius Business Rise

WASHINGTON, July 23 (AP)—The impulse of Edward R. Stettinius Jr. to cut swiftly through red tape obtained quarters for his defense commission staff in three weeks shorter time than department heads thought possible.

Stettinius wanted his staff in the war department munitions building, across the street from his own office in the federal reserve building. He learned that such quarters were available and got proper authorization for them.

But one whole section of the war department needed moving. The offices needed two coats of paint. New equipment had to be brought in. Accustomed to the fast processes of big time business, Stettinius called the proper official and bowed him over with a request for the offices, including the moving job, the painting and the new equipment, on one day's notice.

"But that can't be done, Mr. Stettinius," was the reply. "May-be in a month but—"

Week Allowed—Stettinius relented enough to allow a week for the whole process of moving, painting and equipping.

It was done in a week, though it took a fleet of army trucks to do a hurry up job of hauling in the new furniture.

This faculty of quick action, plus a keen and abiding interest

in his fellow man, comes near to being a dominant Stettinius trait.

His interest in the men around him gave him his first job. When he was at the University of Virginia, the attention of this son of one of the country's keenest industrial organizers, the late "Ed" Stettinius, St. Louis machine manufacturer who became a partner in the Morgan banking firm, was caught by the students who were trying to work their way to an education.

Sets Up Organization

He called some of his friends together, canvassed the town, listed all jobs open to college men and set up a college organization to help ambitious youngsters find a place.

The story of this work came to John L. Pratt, vice president of General Motors. A little later, after Stettinius had finished college, he showed up at the General Motors office to get permission to go through the company plans.

Pratt asked to see him when he got back, told him General Motors wanted an enlarged personnel or industrial relations program.

"We'll give you a trial if you are willing to spend two or three years in the factories on a first hand study," he said. "Learn at first hand what are the problems of the men."

The meteoric rise had started. Successively, he handled all as-

pects of General Motors industrial relations, was vice president in charge of industrial and public relations; directed a share the work movement in the second federal reserve district under Alfred P. Sloan Jr.; was liaison officer between the industrial advisory board of the national recovery administration and the administration; was vice chairman of the United States Steel corporation's finance committee; and, finally, chairman of the board of the corporation. Such a business career might well fill a life time. Stettinius is still only 39, though his hair is prematurely white.

FUNDS ALLOTTED FOR OREGON NYA

PORTLAND, July 23 (AP)—Oregon students will draw from a \$254,727 allotment for the school year opening in September, Ivan G. Munro, state national youth administrator, announced today.

The sum supplements \$482,064 for the NYA's out-of-school work-experience program.

Munro explained that funds for students were \$3000 less than a year ago but predicted only "slight effect" on the number assisted. Maximum earnings will be \$6 a month for high school students, \$20 for college undergraduates and \$30 for graduate students.
