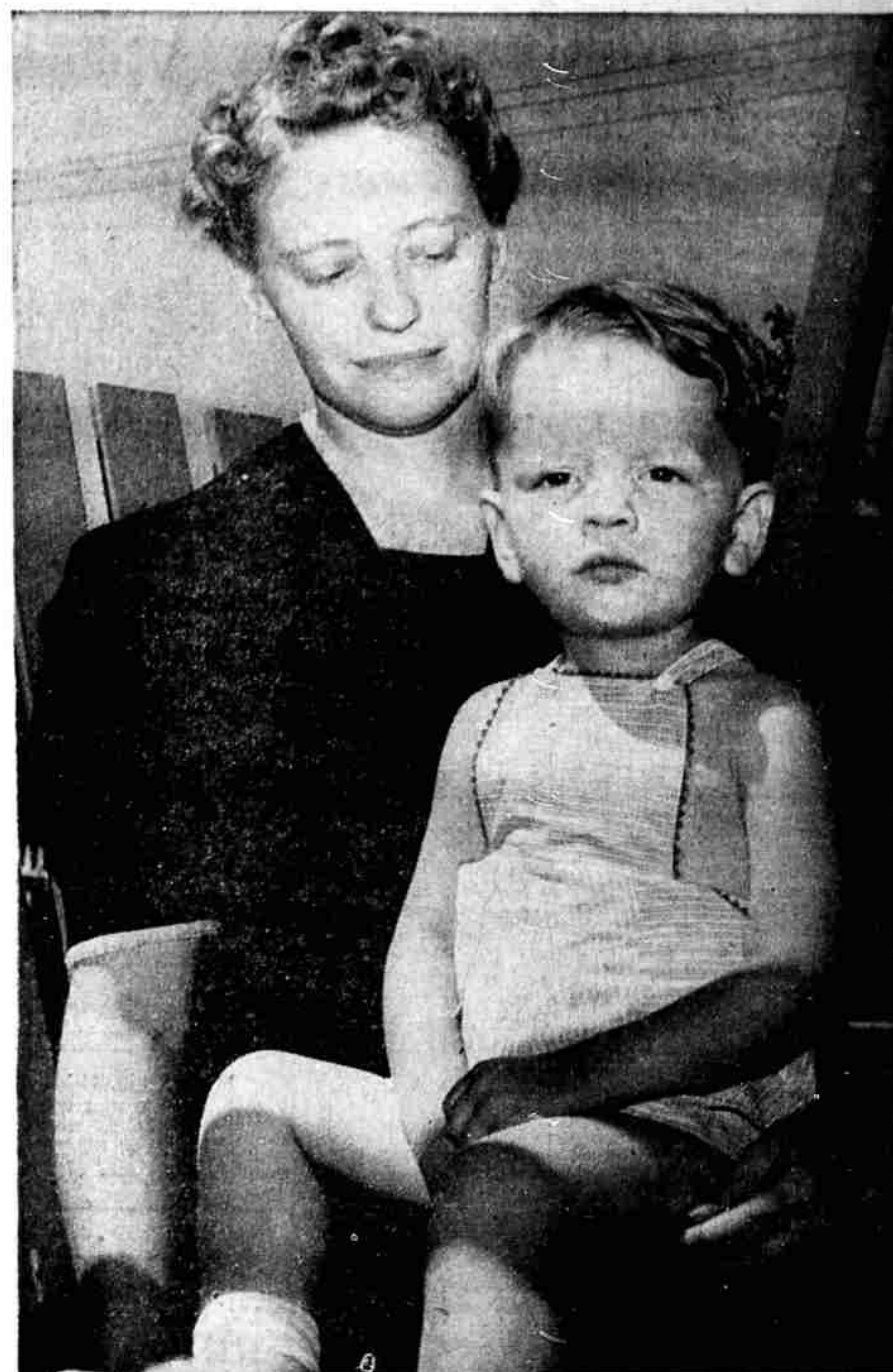
Out-of-Towners
