PLAINTIFFS WIN FORECLOSURE SUIT

Judgment for the plaintiff in a foreclosure suit involving the Crater rooming house on North Second street was granted Monday by Circuit Judge Edward B. Ashurst.

The suit was brought by Frank Cunningham, Rosie Blake, James W. Wright and Clara Keist against Lulu Schroeder, Minnie Reid, Nellie Bayles, Ethel Parry, William Barkley and Emma Bolvin as administrators of the estate of Brenton Barkley.

On December 22, 1925, B. L. Barkley and Fred Buesing entered into an agreement whereby Barkley would pay Buesing \$17,400 and 8 per cent interest, the money to be used in building the rooming house.

Paid on the contract was \$10,467.49 principal and \$8737.52 interest, or a total of \$19,205. Still due is \$8820.81. The suit was brought by heirs of Buesing against heirs of Barkley.

The court found the plaintiffs entitled to have judgment and ordered the property sold unless payment can be made in 40 days. Henry E. Perkins represented the plaintiffs in the case.

AMOS BRACKMAN DIES IN ASHLAND
