

CAKS SINK, SACS RISE IN COAST RACE

SPLIT SERIES OFFERED FANS AS STARS WIN

A split series this week is offered Pacific Coast league fans to break up the monotony of seeing seven clubs chugging along in the backwash of Seattle's pennant machine.

The Rainiers take on Los Angeles ambitious fence wreckers for the first three days, while San Francisco plays at Portland, San Diego at Oakland and Sacramento at Hollywood.

The week past was historic for the decline and fall of the Oakland A's and the rise of Sacramento to a first class power.

Oakland collapsed with enthusiasm, dropping a doubleheader to Hollywood, 2 to 0 and 3 to 2, for six losses out of seven. The Oaks, who have been hustling the Seattle Rainiers most of the season, fell 14 games behind.

Jack Salveson, the Oaks' only consistent winner, made a valiant but futile stand in Sunday's opener, issuing only four hits while his teammates picked up six from Rugger Adirioza.

Sacramento made sacrificial calves of the Padres of San Diego, taking twin wins, 4 to 2 and 7 to 2 for a six-to-one series record.

The double victory was more than enough to boost the Sacs into the first division and skid San Diego only a game behind. Seattle emerged none the worse for an 11-game series in six days with the tag-alongs of the league, the Portland Beavers. Seattle won eight of the games, including Sunday's pair, 3 to 1 and 6 to 5.

Los Angeles and San Francisco split, the Angels taking the first game, 5 to 1, and the Seals the nightcap, 6 to 1. The Angels won the series, 4 to 3.

Young Bob Jensen, starting for San Francisco, won his first league game in dazzling fashion, fanning eight and giving just three hits.

Big Lakes baseball nine overcame a fifth inning tie Sunday at the Tionesta diamond to defeat Shaws Lumber company 7-6 behind the outstanding pitching of Jack Mahoney, who whiffed 16 California batsmen.

B. McDonald singled in the eighth for his third hit of the game and a single by F. Barich scored the winning run.

Harris, Shaw moundsman, puzzled the Klamath batters with a slow curve ball but was unable to hold the locals in the final innings.

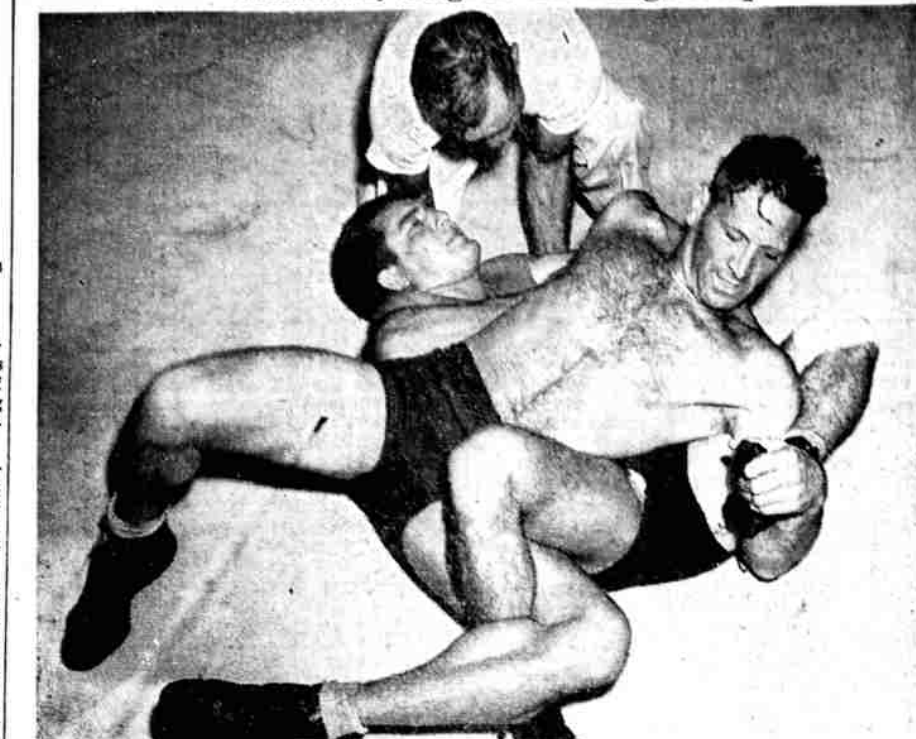

CHALLEDON CAPTURES GOLD CUP

INGLEWOOD, Cal., July 29 (AP)—Challedon, the horse that traveled 3000 miles for a single race, turned back the best the west could send against him and came on to capture the \$50,000 added Hollywood gold cup in track record breaking time.

Running as though out for a brisk canter in his Maryland pasture, the big chestnut son of Challenger II came winging down the stretch with a full length of daylight between him and his nearest rival, Silver State stables Specify. Myron Selznick's rejuvenated Can't Wait was third while the favored Kayak II, standard bearer of the west, was never a contender and finished seventh.

Louis B. Mayers' Joy Boy was fourth.

Challedon, a three to one shot in the mutuels, returned \$7.40, \$4.40 and \$3.40 across the board.

Specify paid \$10.80 and \$5.20 to place and show. Can't Wait returned \$3.40 to show.

Challedon, the horse of the year in 1939, sped the mile and a quarter in 2:02, packing 133 pounds on his broad back and shattering Kayak II's track record by a full second and three-fifths.

Specify At The Turn

A boisterous crowd of 49,000 spectators watched Specify and Joy Boy take the lead as the big 11-horse field broke from the electric starting gate at the foot of the long grandstand stretch. It was Specify, Wedding Call and Joy Boy which broke the wind into the club house turn and down the back stretch with George Woolf holding his charge well back.

Not until the pack pounded around the far turn and into the stretch did the pride of Maryland start his move and from then on the race might well have been ended.

Triumph For Woolf

The victory was a great triumph for Jockey Woolf as well as the star of the W. L. Brann stables, for Woolf captured the Hollywood gold cup for the third consecutive time.

He was aboard Seabiscuit in the first running two years ago and Kayak II last year.

Kayak II, favored at 6-5 in the mutuels, ran with a bar plate on his left forefoot but was never a serious contender and had no excuses.

Chick Improved After Car Wreck

Bobby Chick, Wyoming wrestler who has made the Klamath basin his hangout for the past several weeks, was in an improved condition Monday at the Klamath Valley hospital, where he is undergoing treatment for serious head injuries received when his car overturned on the Spring lake road. Doctors have been unable to determine whether or not he received skull fracture.

Promoter Mack Lillard said he has received hundreds of calls from followers of the popular wrestler, who has appeared many times on local wrestling cards.

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Frank Troeh Still Monarch of Traps After 1940 Shoot

PORTLAND, Ore., July 29 (AP)—Frank M. Troeh of Portland, peer of Pacific coast scattergunners for many a long year, was still monarch Sunday when the firing ceased in the 4-day Pacific International Trapshoot association's 1940 tournament.

He had 398 hits out of 420 shots, winning a Class A 16-yard and the doubles championship.

Titles in two events Sunday which completed the tournament went to H. Carlisle of Salt Lake City with a 96 in the grand Pacific handicap, and Dean Hurd of Salt Lake City with 199 out of 200 in the special 16-yard event.

W. V. Henderson of Seattle tied with H. E. Woolsey of The Dalles, Ore., for second in the Grand Pacific with 95 and won on a toss of the coin. Ray Glass, Eugene, broke 197 birds for second in the 16-yard.
