BOYD REPLIES TO ATTACK BY IWA OFFICIAL

AFL Organizer Joe Boyd, who with other officials of the AFL in the Klamath basin was the object of a verbal attack at the annual IWA picnic last Sunday by Adolph Germer, director of the IWA's organizational drive for the national CIO, issued a reply Tuesday to Germer's speech.

"I am willing to leave expertness on communism and rheumatism with Mr. Germer," Boyd declared. "I do know the difference between dualism and bonafide unionism. These, Mr. Germer has long confused."

Referring to a booklet entitled "Communism's Iron Grip on the CIO," Boyd declared: "It is in the record that John L. Lewis denounced Germer as early as 1930 for disruptive tactics and spoke of him and John Brophy and Powers Haggood in this language: 'Fakirs, repudiated leaders, traitors to the unions, opportunists and purveyors of every falsehood, slander and deception....'"

This statement, Boyd said, was taken from an address by John L. Lewis at the Indianapolis convention in 1930. The booklet on communism to which Boyd referred lists as its source the Congressional Record of the United States government.
