Fishin' Fun

Fishermen have been having a lot of sport on the UPPER LAKE trolling wobblers and bait fishing with cluster eggs. The mouth of WOOD RIVER seems to be most popular. The fish run very large and put up a whale of a fight. Some run up to 12 pounds.

HARRIMAN LODGE at ROCKY POINT has been playing to a full house all week. Most of the people are from out of town and all are catching fish. The fish run anywhere from 2 1/2 to 10 pounds. Most of the non-residents haven't ever caught anything like this and surely are pleased.

CRATER LAKE has been to date about the only place where limit catches are common. The fish are running larger in size but in order to coax them in you have to go deep and use two-bladed flashers and worms.

PAULINA LAKE has been better than far on flies. Best patterns are black gnat, red ant and mosquito. Deep trolling has been fair.

The UMPQUA RIVER has to date been the best for stream fishing of any. Flies are very good with a great number of fish caught on spinners and some on worms and single eggs.

The DESCHUTES RIVER is slowly becoming better. Fly fishing is always best with gray pattern flies most successful.

EAST LAKE has improved on flies. Bait fishing is still good for limits. The fish run small in size.

DAVIS LAKE has shown little or no reports to date.

DIAMOND LAKE reports good fishing. Trolling has picked up. Some good size fish have been caught on flashers and worms. Fly fishing is good in the evening with buck coachman best.

CRESCENT LAKE reports large rainbow trout being taken on trolls.

At SEVEN LAKES and the other small lakes along the Cascade summit catches are not as good as usual. Bait fishing is reported as best.

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## Cards Gather Steam For Pennant Drive

**NEW YORK, July 30 (AP)—**Toying with the prediction that the St. Louis Cardinals would finish the National league's first division came under the heading of risky business after their dismal start this season but a quick glance at the current pace of the Red Birds indicates that they may be getting up steam for a stretch drive.

Last year on this same date, the Cardinals were in fourth place, 12 full games off the pennant pace and only 1 1/4 games out of the second division. They snapped out of it and reeled off a 10 game winning streak, won 22 out of 33 in August and 24 out of 34 in September to wind up in second place, 4 1/4 games back of the Reds.

Presently they face a more difficult task, with an 18-game handicap to overcome. But the Cards have survived a change in managers, and the loss of once-potent Joe Medwick to set a pace that has chalked up 14

victories in their last 19 games, including Monday's 8-3 win over the Boston Bees.

Babe Young's double off Whitey Moore, fourth Cincinnati pitcher, drove in Harry Danning from first with the winning run that gave the New York Giants a 4-3 win over the leading Reds.

The Brooklyn Dodgers blew a six-run lead in the ninth inning but rallied in their half of the frame to shade the Pittsburgh Pirates, 7-6. Passes to Dolf Camilli and Harry Lavagetto and Pete Coscarart's single won the game. Manager Frankie Frisch was banished for protesting too loudly in the sixth and Arky Vaughan of the Pirates and Babe Phelps of the Dodgers were put out for exchanging blows in the ninth. The Dodgers moved to within seven games of the Reds.

Four runs in the seventh gave the Chicago Cubs a 7-3 win over the Philadelphia Phillies. Claude Passeau, former Phil, won his 12th game. Two big innings, a four-run fifth and a five-run seventh, gave the Philadelphia Athletics a 9-7 win over the Detroit Tigers in the only American league game scheduled.

## JEFFRA WHIPS ARMSTRONG, KEEPS CROWN

BALTIMORE, Md., July (UP)—Featherweight Champion Harry Jeffra, Baltimore, Monday night won a 15-round decision over Johnny (Spider) Armstrong, of Toronto, in the final defense of his title.

A capacity crowd of 15,000 persons witnessed the contest.

**Off To Slow Start**

Jeffra, a 6-5 favorite in the pre-fight betting, got off to a slow start and failed to win round until the fifth. He was in serious trouble in the ninth when Armstrong landed the successive hard lefts to the head, followed by three lefts to the body.

The official scorer gave Jeffra seven rounds, Armstrong five and declared three even.

Nat Fleischer, editor of Ring Magazine, refereed the bout. Jeffra's first since he won the crown from Joey Archibald, Providence, R. I., featherweight here last May.

Armstrong weighed 125, Jeffra 124.
