

KLAMATH GIRL IN SHAKESPEARE TOUR

ASHLAND, July 30 — Klamath Falls will have a representative in the court of Queen Elizabeth when she starts her 750 mile good will tour of the state advertising the sixth annual Shakespearean festival to be held August 9 to 17, here.

Miss Phyllis Collier, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Collier is expected here Tuesday to complete final preparations for the jaunt. She will join Carol McCollum of Ashland; Marilyn Sherlock of Grants Pass; Mary Shreve of Medford, who plays the official queen; and Dean Pieper, festival publicity director and will leave Wednesday morning for a three-day trek through the Willamette.

The group will make costumed stops in Medford, Grants Pass, Glendale, Roseburg, Cottage Grove and Eugene the first day, climaxing the preliminary leg of their journey with a special broadcast over KORE.

On Thursday morning, they interview Governor Charles S. Sprague in the state house. This interview will also be broadcast over the Salem station. The remainder of the morning and a portion of the afternoon will be spent in viewing Salem's centennial celebration which opens this week.

The group will appear on KOAC Thursday evening for a half-hour broadcast and will relate the history of the festival for Willamette valley listeners. They stay overnight in Corvallis and leave Friday morning for Ashland, returning here along the coast route.

A second tour through northern California and high-lighted with a costumed appearance in Klamath Falls will be taken within a short time. Plans for this phase are now being completed and will be revealed soon.

IDAHO GOVERNOR SEES COOPERATION IN WEST STATES

PORTLAND, July 30 (AP) — Governor C. A. Bottolfsen of Idaho predicted yesterday that in the near future all 11 western states would be working as a unit to develop their resources.

"The war in Europe, fostered by two or three men putting over the greatest real estate grab in all history, has removed many of the causes for competition between these states," the governor, here on a good will tour with several Idahoans, said at a chamber of commerce luncheon.

He urged Oregon's aid in promoting developments of U. S. highway No. 30, the Old Oregon Trail route, as an "important link between the munitions depots of Utah and Nevada and the Portland and Oregon coast areas."

Governor Bottolfsen was welcomed at Salem by Oregon's Governor Charles A. Sprague, who accompanied him here.

FARM EXPERIMENT REVIEW SCHEDULED

An experimental field day is scheduled for Saturday, August 3, at 1:30 p. m. to give Klamath farmers and others interested in farm problems an opportunity to review agricultural experimental work in Klamath county.

The tour will assemble at the experimental area one mile west of the Klamath Falls airport. The work on the experimental area will be reviewed as will the nematode control work on the Will Blackman farm in the Pine Grove section.

Among the items to be seen

are: alfalfa variety trials on class V land, strawberry clover plots, flax trials, winter wheat trials, general alkali soil reclamation, and methods of root-knot nematode control.

Representatives from the Oregon State College experiment station, local bureau of reclamation, and federal division of nematology, will be on hand at this field day. Everyone is invited to attend.
