STOCK RALLY LIFTS HOPES OF TRADERS

NEW YORK, July 30 (AP)—The stock market today whipped up one of the best rallies in a month and revived hopes among speculative forces that the lengthy stalemate may have been broken.

Industrials, led by steels, motors, aircrafts, mail orders, copers and specialties, followed through at the opening on Monday's late upward reversal and, at the best, gains ranged from 1 to 5 points or so. Utilities, rails and oils were narrow.

Frequent profit taking interruptions were encountered, however, and quotations backed away. Then they resumed the climb. Final prices were under the peaks in some cases but the majority finished well ahead.

While the ticker tape never was pressed, transfers of around 600,000 were the largest for any single July session to date.

Prominent stocks on the upswing included U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Chrysler, Douglas Aircraft, United Aircraft, Montgomery Ward, Sears Roebuck, Du Pont, Anacostia, American Smelting and Great Northern.

Bonds and commodities generally leaned forward.

ARGENTINE ACTION UPS WHEAT PRICE

CHICAGO, July 30 (AP)—Argentina's sudden ban on wheat exports brought a quick advance to wheat prices today before the trade began to argue whether the action was surprising or to be expected.

The first quick reaction was surprise and prices moved more than a cent higher, but later reflection by traders brought mixed reactions. Prices held most of the gains despite assertions that the action merely signified that Argentina was unwilling to further reduce stocks of old wheat with weather conditions unfavorable to the current growing crop. Corn was strengthened by a continuation of heat and drought over much of the belt.

Late rallies carried wheat prices to the best levels of the day with the close 1-1/4 cents above yesterday's finish, September 76 1/4c, December 76 1/4c, and corn closed 1-1/4c up, September 62 1/2c, December 59 1/2c, oats 1-1/4c advanced, and lard 3-10c higher.

Novokoff Ups Batting Lead

LOS ANGELES, July 30 (AP)—Lou Novokoff, Los Angeles outfielder, has increased to 20 points his lead over Steve Messner, San Diego shortstop, in Coast league batting honors through Sunday's games.

Novokoff, who also leads in home runs with 30, has a .358 average. San Diego and Seattle are tied for team batting honors with .284.
