

SNOW FIGHTERS WILL BE BASED AT ODELL LAKE

CASCADIA SUMMIT, Ore., July 31.—The new Willamette highway will be kept clear of snow the year around and the highway commission is now constructing a \$30,000 maintenance and equipment station on the shore of Odell lake.

Homes will be provided for the two families who will be in charge, and the main structure will have rooms for extra men required in snow periods. Contractor Barham of Salem has the contract for these buildings and the work is progressing rapidly. It is expected by fall the buildings will be completed.

People of this mountain area were pleased at the success of the dedication of the Willamette highway Tuesday by Governor Sprague, and the large crowd which turned out for this event. Greyhound buses from Eugene and Klamath Falls brought members of the chambers of commerce from those cities to the luncheon at Summit Lodge, at Cascade Summit. Over a hundred guests attended the luncheon.

The delegation from Klamath Falls was entertained by their own singing of "The Old Gray Mare," "Hail, Hail, the Gang's All Here," and other songs. Among them were noted many artists, who missed their calling.

Immediately after the luncheon, the guests left for the scene of the dedication ceremonies just above the east portal of the tunnel.

Smith died several hours after the accident at a Portland hospital where the other workers, Bruce Baxter and Marvin Lamora, both of Portland, were treated for minor injuries.

In A. H. Querin we found the staunchest of Willkie fans and a man who, we think, typifies the modern forward thinking citizen.

Querin is a traveling man who represents a Portland firm of lumber insurance underwriters. He came west shortly after the last war, leaving a railroad post in Ohio for the hazy prospect of finding a job and settling in the northwest. He found the job and he stayed. He developed with the job and he settled. He is as close to that nebulous being, the average citizen, as one is able to find.

As we said, Querin is a Willkie man. Why is he? We'll list some of his reasons.

"Because Willkie is a business man in a business man's country—which may sound like a catch phrase but goes deeper than that."

"Because Willkie and labor, which must be recognized, have a perfect record of fair dealing and have the respect of each other."

"Because Willkie, starting from scratch, has made a success of his personal life in a way that's so basically, and so solely, American."

Least this column become a sounding board for partisan politics, let's see what Querin has to say on other subjects.

"Our policy," he maintains, "should be one of strength without belligerency. Let us not start calling names across the Atlantic, but let us keep a silence as to our course at the same time staying on our course."

Regarding labor and capital—Labor must follow the precepts and precedents of law and order. It must use legal means to attain its ends, and capital must recognize these means."

Those are some of the views of A. H. Querin, an average citizen.

He was accompanied by a juvenile. The pair drove out of town and around to the west side of the lake, turned around near the end of the Lakeshore drive pavement, and on the return trip had a flat tire near Moore park. Lacking tire-changing tools, they continued riding on the airless tire and drove on to a dirt road leading to Pelican city where they abandoned the car.

State police officers captured the pair shortly thereafter. The juvenile was turned over to Mrs. Ethel Wilson, county juvenile officer.

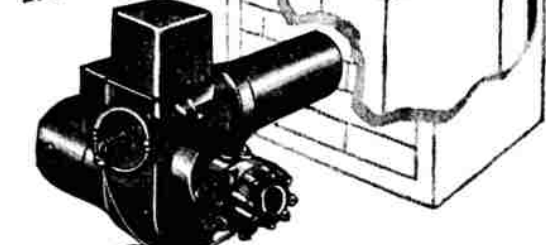

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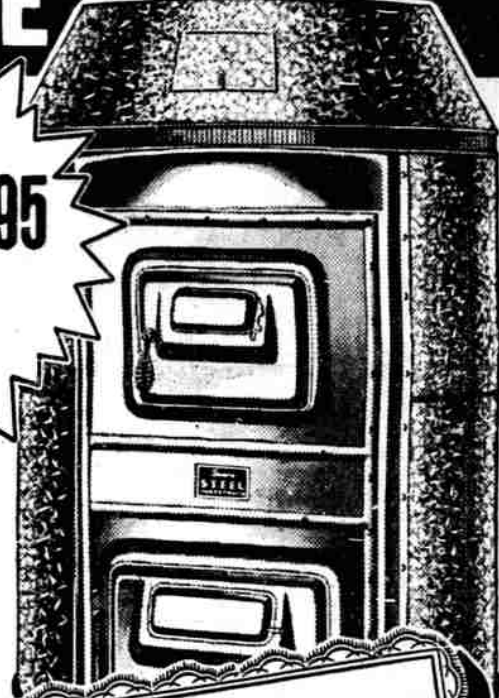
