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TRAFFIC LIGHT INSTALLATION SLATED SOON

Actual work on the installation of new traffic lights for Klamath Falls will probably start before the middle of September and the project will probably be completed about the end of November, it was indicated in a communication received here Wednesday from R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer.

In a letter addressed to Mayor Clifton Richmond, Baldock said the highway department plans to proceed immediately with plans and preparations for the new signal system. Inasmuch as the highway department must advertise two weeks in advance, however, it is doubtful whether the contract can be let by August 22, the date of a highway commission meeting at Portland. Mayor Richmond said he believes, however, that the contract will be let early in September. Highway officials say the project will require between

40 and 45 days to complete. Baldock said a new type of signal light will be demonstrated to the Klamath Falls city council, and if approved, it will be installed in the local project.

RADIOCASTER TO LAUD WILLAMETTE

Commander A. W. Scott, who radiocasts for the Greyhound Stage lines, was looking over the Klamath county Wednesday. Accompanying him on a trip to the south end and the lava beds were Tom Stanley, manager of the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland association, and E. M. Igl, local business man.

Scott attended the Willamette highway opening celebration Wednesday. He said he will make that event the main feature of his program to be broadcast over the Mutual broadcast network from San Francisco Sunday morning at 10:15 o'clock.

The noted travel commentator had charge of the christening of the bus, "Willamette Highway," at the road opening ceremonies. He said this is the first Greyhound bus named for a highway.

Manager Stanley of the Wonderland association said he was taking Scott through all parts of the Wonderland area.

NAVY RUSHING BOMBER ORDERS

PORTLAND, July 30 — The program for the voluntary training of candidates for line officer commissions in the naval reserve is progressing satisfactorily. On July 10, 850 young men between the ages of 19 and 26, inclusive, with a minimum of two years' college education, had been enlisted in the naval reserve for this training. Of this number, 600 embarked on the USS Wyoming at New York on July 15 for a training cruise which will end at New York, August 10. During this cruise, stops will be made at Hampton Roads, Va., and at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

On disembarking on August 10, 300 of the young men who have qualified for the three months' training as reserve midshipmen, and who have volunteered for such training immediately, will join the first class to be conducted by the navy in the USS Illinois at New York City. Captain J. J. London has been assigned as commanding officer of the Illinois reserve midshipmen school and is now making preparations for the first class. Captain London has performed duty as professor of naval science and tactics of the nav-

al ROTC unit at Georgia School of Technology.

On satisfactory completion of this three months' training, reserve midshipmen will be given commissions as ensigns in the naval reserve and may be given an opportunity, if desired, to serve on active duty in the fleet with full pay and allowances.

The second training cruise in connection with this program will be made in three battleships during the period tentatively scheduled for August 19 to September 14. Approximately 1200 men will be cruised during this period.

Training cruises will continue to be made in three battleships. Young men interested in making the second or subsequent cruises should apply for enlistment at the nearest recruiting station or recruiting sub-station.
