STOCKS FAIL TO FIND ANY VISIBLE PATH

NEW YORK, Aug. 1 (AP)—Selected stocks displayed moderately progressive tendencies in today's market but many leaders jogged over a slightly irregular trail.

Price changes, on the whole, were without particular meaning in view of the lightness of dealings throughout. Transfers were around 300,000 shares, or about half yesterday's turnover. Outstanding speculative inspiration, brokers said, was lacking in the general run of news, either from foreign or Rome sources.

Stocks favored most of the day—some eventually wavered—were Bethlehem, Sears Roebuck, International Paper common and preferred, Union Bag & Paper, Westinghouse, General Electric, DuPont, Eastman Kodak, Glenn Martin, United Aircraft and Kennecott.

Backward were International Harvester, Douglas Aircraft, American Telephone, Western Union and American Smelting. Bonds were mixed, with scattered falls and foreign loans edging forward. Commodities got nowhere in particular.

GRAIN BIDS STEADY AS ANALYSIS MADE

CHICAGO, Aug. 1 (AP)—Comparatively steady wheat and corn prices today reflected the grain trader's analysis of August private crop estimates indicating that weather conditions in July reduced the prospective corn and spring wheat harvests 5 and 13 per cent respectively.

The estimates were about in line with trade expectations and were offset to some extent by evidence of recently improved weather conditions for corn and an upward revision in experts' figures of winter wheat production. Some hedging appeared in the wheat pit at times but there was buying credited to mills.

Wheat closed unchanged to 1c lower compared with yesterday's finish, September 76-75c, December 76-1c; corn unchanged to 1c off, September 61-1c, December 58-1c; oats 1-1c lower.

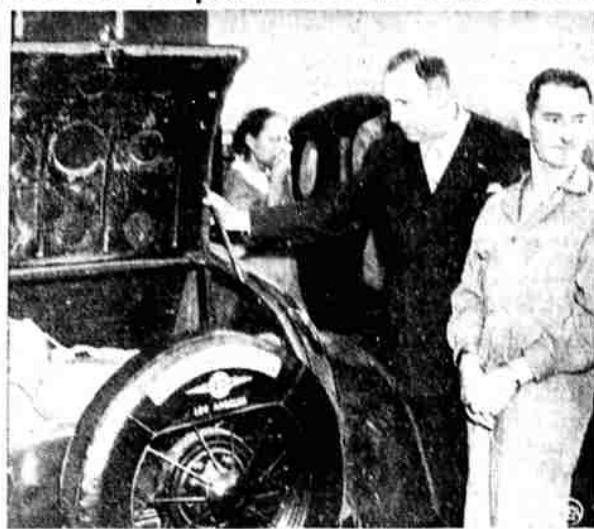
WOOL MARKET
