SCHOOL BREACH SHOULD CLOSE, SPEAKER AVERS

The state board of higher education should undertake a more determined effort to heal the breach between Oregon colleges which "unreconstructed alumni" are helping to maintain, R. C. Groesbeck, Klamath member of the board, said at a meeting of the Kiwanis club Thursday noon.

So long as the people of the state, through the consolidation legislation passed in 1929, decree that there shall be no breach, every effort should be made to close it, the speaker stated.

He said that in his discussions with students and teachers of the University of Oregon and Oregon State college he found little of the old competitive feeling. He indicated that alumni, and citizens of Eugene and Corvallis, are particularly active in keeping the feeling alive.

The board, he indicated, has the whip hand, and it should put forth definite efforts to foster the ideals of unity and a successful system of higher education to which all the various units of the system are complementary.

Groesbeck remarked that he found himself in a most fortunate position of neutrality because he did not attend any of the Oregon schools and no member of his family has attended them. "They all look alike to me," he said.

The speaker said that the consolidation program made effective in 1929 has actually proved economical, the saving being \$300,000 annually despite a 20 per cent increase in enrollment.

He added, however, that the people generally are no longer asked for funds for buildings for the campuses, the money for this purpose coming from the students themselves. He said he does not like this situation, but isn't sure what can be done about it.

Student fees at the Oregon schools, he said, top those of all the public institutions of the west.

DRUNK DRIVING SENTENCE GIVEN

Marvin O. Mellum was handed sentences on counts of drunken driving and non-possession of an operator's permit by Acting Police Judge Leigh Ackerman Thursday morning after an accident in which a passenger in the car he was driving was injured.

Mellum was sentenced to pay \$100 and serve 30 days in jail on the drunken driving charge, and \$5 and two and one-half days in jail on the non-possession charge. Judgment on another charge, hit and run driving, was reserved while an agreement is worked out for repairing an automobile damaged in the accident.

City police said Mellum was the driver of a car which collided with the rear of a parked automobile belonging to Murlin L. Agee, box 477, route 2. The impact badly damaged Mellum's car and injured John Friend, box 322, route 3, who was riding with him. He was treated by a local physician for eye and scalp cuts.

The accident occurred on Riverside drive at 10 o'clock Wednesday night.

TROOP TRAINS TO CROSS KLAMATH
