Shasta CCC Aids Salvage of Wrecked Plane Near Camp

MOUNT SHASTA, Calif.—An opportunity to serve their country in time of need was given the members of Camp Mount Shasta, company 978, CCC, when a pursuit ship (part of the nation's giant armada) crashed near their camp last Thursday evening.

The plane, a Curtiss Wright Hawk, was headed north as part of a squadron of like planes from Moffett field. Near Mott field the oil line developed trouble and the pilot, Lieutenant Wright, decided to land at the emergency field to repair the broken part. Due to the deceiving appearance of the field from the air and its inadequate length for this type of high-speed plane, the pilot came into the field at too high a speed. He gunned the motor and pulled up, preparatory to circling the field and making another attempt; but as he rose about 80 feet into the air and a quarter mile past the field, his motor cut out entirely, causing him to lose altitude. A crash being inevitable, the pilot thought fast and spun his plane sideways into the brush since a head-on crash into the ground would cause the plane to turn over, possibly injuring him seriously.

Having negotiated the landing without injury to himself, the lieutenant reported the crash to his superiors through the camp telephone and a detail of men were dispatched to guard the plane day and night against souvenir hunters and also the taking of photographs which is prohibited by the war department regulations.
