practically none since a "moral embargo" was imposed by the US last year for the bombing of Chinese civilians. During the first six months of 1940 Germany and Italy likewise bought no American aviation gasoline, practically all of the export going to Britain and France.)

LONDON, Aug. 1 (AP)—Authoritative British sources expressed the fear today that the Japanese-British relations might grow "progressively worse" even up to the point where the Japanese would risk military pressure.

These circles, however, expressed the conviction that Japan would not venture into "total war" with Britain because of the possibility of the involvement of other powers—the United States, perhaps, or Russia.

The nature of future Japanese-British relations, it was added, depended on whether the "extremists" within the Japanese government retained the upper hand.

The arrest of 14 Britons in connection with Japanese investigations of alleged foreign espionage was mentioned as an instance of "extremist" pressure upon Britain, following upon her concession to Japan on closing the Burma arms route to China.

Japanese-U. S. Showdown Seen By Refugees

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 1. (UP)—Rapid approach of a Pacific showdown between the United States and Japan was seen yesterday by numerous refugees from Asia arriving on the S. S. President Coolidge.

The Coolidge carried 657 persons, including British, French, American, Chinese and Germans escaping from the spreading Asiatic war zone.

Arthur Shorey, official of the National City bank of New York, said surface indications in Asia point to a "Japanese lineup with the axis powers." Shorey described American and Japanese diplomatic activities as "poker-playing sessions."

Major J. M. McHugh, attaché of the American embassy in China, said the situation was "tense" in the far east, especially since complications resulting from Japan's insistence of British closure of the Burma road which carried war supplies to China.

While here he conferred with local AFL officials at the Labor temple, Nickerson, who was here for the recent State Federation of Labor convention, is a candidate for reelection as executive secretary.

IDAHO NEGRO SLAYS 2, SHOT

BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 1 (UP)—With dynamite tear gas and bullets a posse yesterday blasted a barricaded negro squatter from his grazing land shack after he had killed two federal officers who came to evict him.

The killer, Pearl Royal Hendrickson, 50, died of multiple wounds in an ambulance en route to Boise. He was clutching a book entitled "Egyptian Secrets" and wore a cross and rabbit's foot around his neck.

For three hours he returned the rifle, shotgun and sub-machinegun fire of state police and G-men. Incendiary machinegun bullets ordered by Guy Bannister, FBI director at Butte, Mont., finally fired the dwelling. Smoke choking him and helpless from his wounds, the negro ceased firing and the officers rushed him, dragging him out of the fire.

Ordered Off — Hendrickson had been ordered off the federal property but refused to comply. He had worked in a mineral claim which he officially was informed was worthless. He was a war veteran and from compensation he received fought eviction orders in court. Finally he was told to leave his claim or be in contempt of court. This he ignored.

Then Deputy U. S. Marshal John Glenn motored with Boise Police Captain George Haskins to Hendrickson's clearing in the forest of Bogus basin, 10 miles north of Boise to serve an order to vacate. Glen stepped out and approached the one-room shack Hendrickson built. A 30-30 rifle bullet killed him.

Returns for Help — Haskins wheeled the car and returned for Marshal George Meffan, former mayor of Nampa, Idaho, and democratic candidate for governor in 1936.

Meffan met Glenn's fate. Again Haskins went for help, and some 50 men responded.

Coroner Clyde Summer arrived on the scene, saw the two bodies, and a lookout shouted to him to get all the ammunition in town he could. He did, and G-men reinforced the posse.

The clearing which Hendrickson occupied was to have been included in a recreational park. A forestry worker who recently saw him warned Glenn and Meffan Hendrickson said: "If they come after me they'd better bring an undertaker."

ing nearby said he heard no screams.

Most of the passenger victims were residents of the Akron district, although the coach, which shuttled the 12 miles from Hudson, O., to Akron, had picked up passengers at Hudson from the Pennsylvania's Cleveland-Pittsburgh line.

It was the second big American railroad tragedy in four months. Thirty-one persons died in the wreck of the New York Central's Lake Shore Limited at Little Falls, N. Y., April 19.

Willkie Starts Mapping Plans For Campaign

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Aug. 1 (UP)—Wendell L. Willkie abandoned temporarily today his Elwood, Ind., acceptance speech and began mapping campaign plans.

He indicated after a conference with Gov. Payne H. Ratner of Kansas that he would strike soon for the agricultural vote of the middlewest. He was "assured" by the 43-year-old Ratner that he would win in Kansas by 100,000 votes.

Willkie announced after conferring with Ratner, Harry Dabby, national committeeman from Kansas, and Walter Fees, Kansas state chairman, that he would make at least one speech in Kansas.

The youthful-looking governor reported there was "a definite anti-democratic trend in Kansas" and said that the state "is very proud and happy" about its part in turning to Willkie and helping in his campaign.

British Merchant Cruiser in Port After Sea Fight

RIO DE JANEIRO, Aug. 1 (AP) The heavily gunned British armed merchant cruiser Alcantara, damaged in a running sea fight with a German raider in the south Atlantic, steamed slowly into the harbor here at mid-morning.

The 22,209-ton Alcantara was heavily camouflaged.

From the shore only one of her two normal funnels was visible. She moved at once toward the Vianna island shipyards.

Twenty-four hours is the normal period which a ship of a belligerent nation is permitted to remain in a neutral port. Extensions may be granted under certain circumstances, such as when repairs are necessary to make her seaworthy.

A Brazilian navy spokesman indicated last night the Alcantara might have delayed her arrival to facilitate preparations for quick repair work.

British warcraft presumably were continuing pursuit of the raider, as indicated in an admiralty statement in London yesterday.

An embassy statement said the sea battle occurred near the Brazilian island of Trindade—well within the American neutrality zone—and that both ships were hit, the Alcantara suffering "slight damages." The embassy said the raider mounted eight six-inch guns.

Foreign Agents In Panama Held For Deportation

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1 (AP)—Secretary of War Stimson said today that 81 foreign agents in the Panama canal zone had been detained for deportation.

Stimson was asked at his press conference to comment on a newspaper report that 265 nazis were working on Panama canal projects.

In response he read a statement which said:

"There are now 81 foreign agents illegally in the canal zone. They are being detained at the immigration station awaiting arrangements for deportation or other disposition.

"There are no aliens employed either by the army or by the canal zone other than Panamanians."

LEADER SAYS RUSSIA WON'T ENTER FIGHT

here, there could be little chance of improving our relations."

LONDON, Aug. 1 (UP)—Unconfirmed reports reached London today that Adolf Hitler has informed Finland she cannot expect German aid against possible further Russian demands, leading to speculation that the soviets may attempt to annex all of Finland.

These reports coincide with indications of a steady aggravation of Anglo-Russian relations as Adolf Hitler and Josef V. Stalin draw increasingly closer together in matters of European policy.

Balkan Developments

Developments in the Balkans also were interpreted in some quarters as reflecting a thorough German-Russian understanding. Some observers believed the co-operation might be extended to German support of soviet participation in control of the Danubian.

The soviet absorption of the Baltic nations, Latvia, Lithuania and Estonia, was assumed to have been accomplished with unqualified German acquiescence.

Efforts to improve British-Russian relations had failed so far, despite the strenuous efforts of Sir Stafford Cripps, new ambassador to Moscow. Early in June Cripps submitted general proposals for Anglo-soviet trade agreements. He was advised that he could expect a reply, but it has not been delivered.

Britain to Reject

Britain probably will reject a protest by soviet Ambassador Ivan Maisky against the Bank of England's failure to transfer to the soviet state bank the deposits of the three Baltic central banks here. Moscow is reported to have protested also to Washington regarding the

failure of the federal reserve bank to transfer the Baltic bank holdings to Russia.

Anglo-Japanese tension failed to effect a converse improvement of British-soviet relations, but British sources expressed doubt of rumors that a Russian-Japanese deal was impending. Particularly they discounted a story that Japan was considering offering Russia a part of Manchukuo as a pledge for the security of Vladivostok.
