DEFENDANTS WIN ACCIDENT TRIAL

A circuit court jury Thursday night returned a verdict for the defendant in the case of Bessie Rowe versus Fannie and Milo Cheyne.

The suit arose out of an automobile accident on December 8, 1936, at 3 a. m., on Lakeshore drive. Mrs. Rowe was a passenger in a car driven by Con K. Murphy and Cheyne was driver of a car which had as passengers J. E. Lee and Hank Lovell.

The plaintiff alleged she suffered a crushed nose and compound fracture of the right ankle. She sued for \$5000 general damages and a number of special damage items. The jury turned down her claims after about two hours and 45 minutes deliberation.

L. Orth Sisemore and Tom Chaburn represented Fannie and Milo Cheyne, the defendants, while U. S. Balentine represented Mrs. Rowe.

PHYSICAL EXAMS DUE IN CAA PLAN

All persons planning to enter the civilian pilot training program should take physical examinations immediately, it was stated Friday by Earl C. Reynolds, secretary of the chamber of commerce, sponsoring organization.

Examiners are Dr. C. V. Rugh and Dr. Ralph W. Stearns.

Reynolds conferred Friday with Carl W. Nelson, private flying specialist of the civil aeronautics authority, who came here to help him out details in the CAA training program.

Forty students have already filed blanks. Fifty-two others have indicated they plan to file, but have been delayed because of a shortage of application blanks.

PORTLAND SCHOOL HEAD MAKES TALK

America will remain the kind of America it is if proper advantage is taken of the opportunities offered through the educational system, Ralph Dugdale, superintendent of schools of Portland, stated in a talk on guidance to the Rotary club Friday noon at the Willard.

Dugdale pointed out that totalitarian countries have indoctrinated their young people with the ideas of fascism, nazism and communism, and that they have made tremendous increases in their educational outlays for that purpose. The United States, he said, will be making a grave mistake if it misses the opportunity to indoctrinate young Americans with the ideas of democracy.

Discussing vocational guidance, the speaker urged that parents and teachers make every effort to "go along with" young people, permitting them to consider fully the vocations open to them and to make their own decisions.

He commented on the fact that there is a dearth of youngsters interested in the trades, while far too many want to enter the professions.

The speaker outlined the guidance program now being followed in Portland, with hundreds of business men giving personal interviews to vocational school boys and girls on vocational problems.

Chairman of the day was R. C. Groesbeck.

COUNTRY CLUB ASKS TOWN CLUB PROFITS

Suit was filed in circuit court Friday by the Embassy Country club against T. B. Watters, local business man, in connection with the Embassy Town club at 624 Main street.

The plaintiff alleges that Watters, since 1938, has controlled the Embassy Town club, and further asserts that he has failed to turn over net income from the Embassy Town club to the plaintiff. In the complaint the income is estimated at more than \$20,000.

The plaintiff asks the court that the Embassy Town club be decreed the property of the Embassy Country club, that the defendant be required to give an accounting and that such funds as are properly due the Embassy Country club be turned over to it.

CLERK INJURED IN MAIN STREET FIRE

Mayor Urges Citizens Join In Tribute to Sugar Industry

This has been proclaimed as "Oregon Sugar Time" by Mayor Clifton Richmond. Throughout the state the period from August 2 to 17 is being so observed, to direct attention of the public to Oregon's growing sugar industry.

Biggest development of the industry is at Nyssa, where the Amalgamated Sugar company has erected the nation's newest beet sugar factory.

David W. Evans, of Stevens and Wallis, public relations counsel for the firm, states that last year the plant produced 728,000 100-pound bags of sugar and this

year will approach 1,000,000 bags. The factory's payroll this year will be \$300,000.

The observance of "Oregon Sugar Time" has special significance here because of the development of beet seed growing in this territory.

Mayor Richmond's proclamation set the August 2 to 17 period as a time for this community to join with Governor Sprague and other communities of the state "in acknowledging the part the new sugar industry is playing in the progress and prosperity of Oregon."

LOS ANGELES PAIR CHARGED WITH STRONG-ARM JOBS

A series of strong-arm robberies is attributed to Ed Whipple and Ed Gonzales, young men held in jail here for Los Angeles authorities, according to Los Angeles officers here to return the prisoners south.

Officers H. C. Lindley and C. H. Bridgeman of the robbery bureau of the Los Angeles police department said the two prisoners were alleged members of a mob that made it a practice to slug people on the streets at night.

The sluggings occurred after 1 a. m. Small sums were usually netted by the mobsters, who operated in a certain locality in Los Angeles.

The prisoners have waived extradition and were expected to be taken to Los Angeles Friday night.

HEARING SCHEDULED ON FOR-HIRE BIDS

All persons desiring to obtain permits from the public utilities commission for the for-hire transportation of agricultural commodities must appear at a public hearing to be held here late in August, it was announced at the local PUC offices.

Commodities included under this regulation, for the most part, will be potatoes and grain in the harvest soon to get under way in the Klamath basin.

Applications for the permits must be received at the commissioner's office at Salem on or before Thursday, August 15, and must be accompanied by the following: police inspection report of the equipment to be operated, which must be filed even though a permit in some other class is already held by the applicant; filing fee of \$2.50; public liability and property damage insurance policy or certificate complete with Oregon uniform endorsement; signed contracts between carrier and the shipper or shippers for whom he proposes to haul, the contract forms to be secured at the local office.

Assistance in preparing applications will be given at the commissioner's office at 123 North Fourth street. This office is open from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. on Fridays, from 8 a. m. to 1 p. m. on Saturdays and from 8 a. m. to 11 a. m. on other week days.
