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you read. He then entered upon a lengthy review of the conscription question.

He also announced that he and democratic tax leaders in congress were agreed that an excess profits tax should be enacted without delay.

All manufacturers working on defense orders knew that such legislation was going to be passed, he said, and were proceeding to assemble materials even though contracts have not yet been signed.

HOUSE COMMITTEE AIRS CONSCRIPTION

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Malcolm Baldrige of Omaha, Neb., testified that volunteer recruiting had failed and conscription was "the only logical and reasonable answer." He also argued that senate sentiment for registration on only the 21 to 31 age group of men would "soften up opposition" to the Burke-Wadsworth compulsory bill.

The Reverend Charles B. Rose, Chicago, secretary of the Methodist churches' commission on world peace, said the commission was "unalterably opposed" to the bill because it would disrupt social and religious liberties and "moves in the direction of dictatorship."

Captain Gill Robb Wilson, Washington president of the national aeronautical association, testified that the first "compelling fact that will give the aggressors pause is compulsory military training."
