For six years Oregon has claimed the unique distinction of having the only civic Elizabethan theatre in the world. Founded in 1935 by Professor Angus L. Bowmer, the Oregon Shakespearean Festival association has provided a cultural center where drama lovers from all over the country may come and enjoy the greatest works in dramatic literature.

Intensive training has been underway at Ashland, setting for the Shakespearean plays, for the past two months in preparation for the sixth season's opening on August the ninth, and many Klamath people are making plans to attend at least one or two, if not all, of these plays that are presented in a streamlined modern manner.

The festival will open with "The Merry Wives of Windsor" on August the ninth, which will be repeated on the fourteenth. "Much Ado About Nothing" will be presented August the tenth and the fifteenth; on August the twelfth and sixteenth the play will be "The Comedy of Errors" and "As You Like It" will be staged on August the thirteenth and seventeenth.

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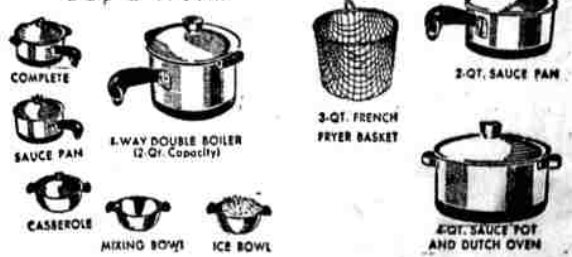
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
