

ATTENDANCE UP AT BOY SCOUT SUMMER CAMP

An attendance gain of 15 per cent over last year was chalked up for the summer camp just ended at Crescent lake by the Modoc area council of the Boy Scouts, according to Dwight Gilchrist, scout executive. The rolls listed 180 boys in the course of the four weeks.

A number of projects pointing toward an eventual model camp were completed by the scouts this year. Boys working on the carpentry merit badge had nearly completed another cabin when the camp period ended. The structure will be braced and the siding finished before winter sets in.

Besides laying the foundation for the new cabin, scouts interested in the masonry merit badge built 50 feet of the projected 150-foot concrete dock on the lake front.

An outdoor shower operating on the thermo-siphon principle was built and plans call for completing the shower house next year.

Camp Fire Girls from Redmond and Bend are using the camp this week and the Boy Scouts will go up next week to close up the camp and prepare the buildings and equipment against damage during the winter.

Gilchrist announced that a collection of articles left at the camp is being kept at the Boy Scout office. Boys or their parents may reclaim the articles by identifying them at the office within the next 30 days, after which the remainder will be given away.

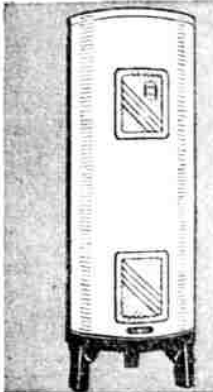

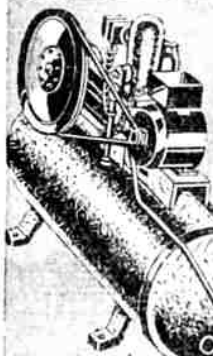

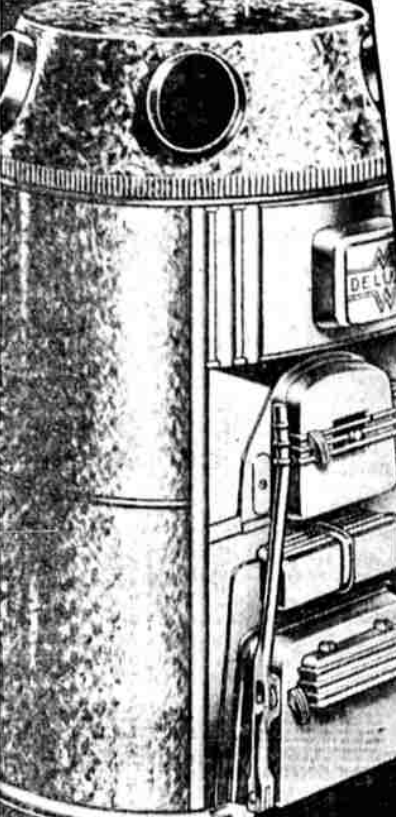
