

COOPERATION URGED TO SAVE TIMBER LANDS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7 (UP)—Public and private cooperation to save the nation's great timber reserve in the Pacific Northwest was urged in a report issued Monday by the Charles Lathrop Pack Forestry foundation.

The report—a long-range program for the use and protection of Washington and Oregon forests—was placed before the joint congressional committee on forestry for consideration in the preparation of new forestry legislation.

Urges Cooperation
The far-reaching program was prepared by Bruce Hoffman, who urged state and federal cooperation with private industry to increase returns from the forests and to improve forestry practices.

The study dealt mainly with special forestry problems of the Douglas fir region of Oregon and Washington.

"Appreciable progress toward preservation of the present young stands from wasteful and untimely exploitation and toward a stable system of marketing and finance necessitates a free and strong cooperation between government and private agencies," Hoffman said.

Hoffman listed the major deterrents to development of the northwest timber reserve:

1. Present tax system and the "general uncertainty of the future arising from recognition that the requirements of government are steadily advancing.
2. Labor costs. The average wage rate has risen "to something over 75 cents an hour, an increase of 22 per cent in 10 years, while average f.o.b. lumber prices have declined \$3 to \$4 per 1000 board feet."

Public Owns Fir
Hoffman pointed out that nearly half of the Douglas fir forest region is in public ownership.

"Obviously," he said, "the forest service, state and other government agencies should make their general policies sufficiently stable and clearly stated so private capital can proceed with confidence that reasonable and equitable land management will be the underlying policy of government."

Aerial Photographs Reveal Historical Secrets of Wreck-strewn Ocean Shoals

MANTEO, N. C., Aug. 7 (UP)—Folks along outer banks of North Carolina wondered this week whether aerial photographs, made from U. S. coast guard amphibians, would reveal many historical secrets of wreck-strewn diamond shoals which treacherous currents and shifting sands have kept entombed for many years.

The battered hulk of the USS Monitor, first iron-clad battleship in the world, already has been identified and other wrecks lying on the bottom of this graveyard of the Atlantic are plainly visible.

Camera Most Effective
Light conditions during the four-hours experimental flight which photographed the Monitor, the Civil War Union "cheesebox on a raft," were not ideal and laboratory examinations will be necessary before complete results are determined. But test shots have indicated that the camera lens will be the most effective way of exploring the swirling waters, which historians have virtually forgotten because of the difficult approach.

Back of the research is Dr. Gilbert Grosvenor, president of the National Geographic society, who two years ago became interested in the possibility of unveiling maritime history through aerial photography.

Project Continued
Plans for photographing the hulks from glass-bottom boats and even for raising ships were considered before it was decided to try aerial photographs. It is believed the aerial project will be continued in light of experience gained on the initial expedition.

J. S. Roberts, staff cameraman of National Geographic magazine, made the experimental shots, taking over 200 photographs from altitudes varying from 50 to 2700 feet.

A heavy haze hung over the shoals and light did not penetrate any great depth of water as the coast guard's two-motored Douglas circled about for four hours.

NEW YORK, Aug. 7 (AP)—In lies a tale. When Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt has time to see James Fikany and when James Fikany has time to see her, she will become the possessor of:

One pair of gold-and-silver evening slippers boasting a T-strap.

One pair of sport shoes of brown gabardine, trimmed with brown patent leather and equipped with the regulation instep strap. And her feet will feel fine.

This will be very soon, now, because Mrs. Roosevelt likes Mr. Fikany's shoes—and there-

in lies a tale. The key to this tale is a number: U. S. patent No. 2,044,751.

Two-score years as a cobbler and the expenditure of his life savings of \$90,000 is the reason James Fikany can make Mrs. Roosevelt's feet feel fine. A secondary reason is that Mrs. Fikany had "terrible trouble" with her feet nine years ago.

One day in 1931 Mrs. Fikany came to her husband in his little shoe-making and repair shop in Carbondale, Pa., and said: "Jim, my feet feel awful."

Can't you make me a comfortable pair of shoes?"

Willing To Please

Mr. Fikany had some other things on his mind—although he was and is always willing to do anything to please Mrs. Fikany, which is nice—but a couple of months later a woman customer entered his shop and sowed the seed of an idea.

"Why can't you make me a shoe with an adjustable arch?" she complained.

Mr. Fikany (who always looks at a foot before a face) watched her limp out, bit his lip and started thinking. He thought and he thought and finally began work on a little metallic device now known as U. S. patent No. 2,044,751.

It took the cobbler, now 56, four years to perfect the device

that has taken him from his tiny shop to a large new shoe factory in Rochester, N. Y., just opening, where he plans to turn out 1500 pairs of Fikany adjustable arch shoes daily with the aid of 300 employees he already has hired.

Four thousand pair already grace and brace the feet of many ladies throughout the land. Mrs. Roosevelt has bought 16 pair.

The device, through an intricate sliding system, can not only lengthen or shorten the arch of a shoe, but can raise or lower it independently of length—that is, his mechanism can provide a short high arch, a long high arch, a short low arch or a long low arch.

Oh, yes—the first lady wears size 7½ A.
