F. R. ACCEPTS JIM FARLEY'S RESIGNATION

HYDE PARK, N. Y., Aug. 8 (AP)—President Roosevelt accepted the resignation of James A. Farley as postmaster general today. It is effective August 31. The president said their friendship would always continue.

Mr. Roosevelt dictated a letter to Farley in which he said he accepted the resignation with "real regret," wished Farley success in private business and praised his administration of the postoffice department.

"All of us in the administration," the president wrote, "will miss you deeply; we count on seeing you often. I especially count on this after all of our years of close personal association. Our friendship will always continue."

Among reports of Farley's future activities is one that he would head a syndicate in purchasing the New York Yankee baseball property.

The resignation will be effective two weeks after Farley steps out of his post as national chairman of the democratic party.

Farley resigned his political post after the Chicago convention in July, giving as his reason a desire to return to private life.

Farley, a political ally of the chief executive of many years standing, said in his letter of resignation, dated yesterday, that he, too, felt sincere regret at taking the step, listed accomplishments of the postal service, and added:

"During my lifetime I shall cherish the associations and friendships which I have made while serving as postmaster general, both in the postal service and in other departments and agencies of the federal government."

"I know that it will please you to learn that I have made definite arrangements for my future in private business where I know I shall be very happy."

'FLOOZIES' COME DOWN FROM WALL

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 8 (AP)—The roisterous title—"Sailors and Floozies"—was bad enough, but when the navy saw that painting, it knew it had been outraged.

And the result was that Paul Cadmus' conception of a sailor's diversions ashore came down in a hurry from where it was hanging in the palace of fine arts at Treasure Island.

Conceding that the painting was "unpleasantly dirty," Dr. Walter Hell, one of the officials at the fine arts exhibit, said "if it were a master work, I'd take a stand against shoving it."

"But so far as I'm concerned, it's not a masterpiece and is just unpleasant," he explained. "The navy wanted to make a do about the picture, so we thought it simpler to remove it."

"Sailors and Floozies" was not the first painting by Cadmus, a satiric artist, to arouse the navy's displeasure. Back in 1934 he turned out a picture called "The Fleet's In," which Admiral Hugh Rodman called an "unwarranted insult to the navy."

The admiral saw a photograph of "The Fleet's In" and, before it could be exhibited, denounced it as something that must have "originated in the imagination of someone who had no conception of actual conditions in our service."

RAILROAD NEWS

Many naval recruits have been passing through Klamath Falls on passenger trains over Southern Pacific lines during the past several days en route to training at San Diego.

CYCLOTRON SHOWS NEW MEDICAL PATH

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 8—The first definite medical advance against disease through the use of products made by the University of California's atom-smashing cyclotron was reported today by Dr. John Lawrence, of the university's medical school.

Dr. Lawrence told the Radiological Society of North America that many leukemia and polycythemia patients had shown substantial improvement after being given repeated doses of radioactive phosphorus. He said, however, there was nothing to indicate that the treatment was more effective than x-ray applications so far as final results were concerned.

Leukemia is a disease in which the white blood cells multiply rapidly until they upset the normal ratio of red and white cells in the life fluid. In polycythemia the red blood cells multiply uncontrolled.

Dr. Lawrence reported the cyclotron substance appeared to have certain technical advantages over the x-ray because it did not cause some of the undesirable after-effects of x-radiation and that it could be used to permeate the whole system. X-rays can be applied only to one part of the body at a time.

But more research will have to be done before the ultimate value of the treatment can be put into general medical practice, Dr. Lawrence said.
