

GIRL SCOUTS CAMP VISITED BY OFFICIALS

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Stopping Over

A column of chat about
Klamath visitors.

Today we have another slice from a cross-section view of Klamath Falls semi-itinerants. He's John Hazen, about 25.

Hazen is a native of Tacoma, Wash., sent here by the lumber company for whom he works, which puts him in the realm of Stopping Over.

His background includes a stretch at Willamette university, topped by a period at Boston university, from where he graduated.

More widely read and more deeply interested in current events, news and problems than the average young man of 25, Hazen has evolved more beliefs, more platforms than that elusive young man.

By the same token, his stand on current issues can not justly represent youth's views taken by and large. Nevertheless, here are a few:

On the U. S. and the war, he feels we must prepare—quickly and extensively. Hazen thinks that every precaution must be taken to guard against the possibility of invasion, no matter what the probability of such an event.

He reasons that we are in almost identical the same position in which France and Britain failed to find themselves in 1938, that the imminence of a war on these shores is dependent only upon the loss or retention of the British fleet, and that as long as a possibility exists of that loss, we should do everything in our power to provide an adequate substitute.

He does not, however, believe England will fall to Hitler's lightning war as readily as does Hitler.

Hazen sees as more likely than an immediate physical invasion on America—in the event of Britain's fall—the probability of an economic war with this country, with Germany marshalling a superior force, and with South America as the main theatre of operation.

An important regiment in the Nazi trade battalions, says Hazen, will be the advance guard already operating—the termite fifth column.

Not to be overlooked, he warns, is the virtual certainty of Japanese cooperation with the many-spoked axis powers. On the U. S. and in the U. S.—the coming November ballot battle for president—Hazen is chronically Wilkie. His reasons—Wilkie's record of traditional Americanism, his similarity to and consequent parallel understanding of the average American business man, whom Hazen regards as the moving force behind those things essentially ours, and Wilkie's thus far spotless record in private life.

The industrialist's remarkable grasp of political ideals and methods impressed Hazen. He won't make a flat prediction on next fall's result, but thinks if the republican campaign doesn't falter through poor advice or management, the eight-year GOP dry spell will be over.

We've covered just the high-spots in one young man's atti-

tude toward The World, 1940, but thought they were worthwhile recording. Most of them are pretty general, some have a trend toward a pronounced stand, all of them are a step forward.

TOURIST BUSINESS CONTINUES TO LAG

SALEM, Aug. 8 (AP)—Oregon's tourist business continues to lag behind last year's record, despite official predictions that the European war and the San Francisco fair would send many more visitors to Oregon in 1940.

July non-resident automobile registrations totaled 27,125, compared with 31,721 in July 1939. There were 74,417 out-of-state cars registered in the first seven months of this year, a drop of 10,318 from the total in the same period last year.

More than half the non-resident cars are from California. Part of the drop in registration was caused by travel and exchange restrictions placed on Canadians by their government.

Ashland continued to be the leading port of entry, registering 16,510 cars during the seven months. Other registration stations include: Cave City 10,420, Brookings 5959, Grants Pass 3969, Umatilla 3416, Klamath Falls 3166, Portland 2614, Medford 2598, Arlington 2595, Bend 2244, Gold Beach 2072, Eugene 1758, Roseburg 1415, Huntington 1413, Pendleton 1140 and Baker 1116.

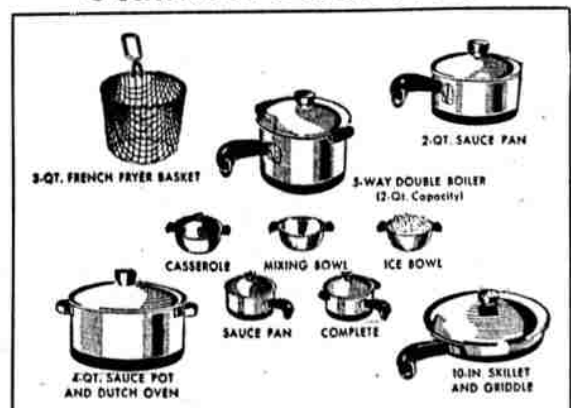
