DRESS REHEARSAL SET IN ASHLAND

ASHLAND, Aug. 6—Thursday night is the date for the final dress rehearsal before the opening of the Shakespearean plays to be presented here August 9 to 17.

Since the day of final casting last June, rehearsals have been conducted day and night pending the final week of presentation. Tourists from all over Oregon are already arriving in Ashland to view the productions of "The Merry Wives of Windsor," August 9 and 14; "Much Ado About Nothing," August 10 and 15; "The Comedy of Errors," August 12 and 16; and "As You Like It," August 13 and 17.

Director William David Cottrell has chosen four of Shakespeare's greatest comedies, and is presenting them in a streamlined modern manner. The plays have been adapted and revised by Dorothy Pruitt so as to make the language and wording of Shakespeare more easily understandable to the theatre audience.

The Oregon Shakespearean Festival association is expecting a larger turnout than ever before for the sixth annual festival.

Reserved seat tickets are available at the Klamath county chamber of commerce in Klamath Falls, and general admission tickets may be obtained on the nights of performances at the Ashland box office.

'Great Fun,' Says Texas Flier of Channel Battles

LONDON, Aug. 8 (AP)—Arthur Donahue, 27-year-old American volunteer flier from Laredo, Tex., was given credit by the Royal air force Tuesday for the "probable" destruction of a German plane in a dogfight over the English channel.

To Donahue, who joined up because he "wanted to do something more than just teach other people to fly," the fight was "great fun."

Donahue and other members of a spitfire squadron shot down two Messerschmitt-109 fighters and possibly downed two others in battle off the French port of Calais yesterday.

Donahue had 1800 hours of flying experience before he enlisted. His name was temporarily withheld by the RAF because of the British emphasis on teamwork.

Convinced (Descriptions of him, however, had convinced Robert F. Donahue, Lowell, Mass., radio station manager, that he was his brother, Arthur, for the past two years a flying instructor at Laredo. Arthur went to Canada to enlist with the British air force, and his family received word July 17 of his arrival in England.)

The young American joined the spitfire squadron less than 24 hours before the engagement. Known to his British mates as "Texas Shorty," he returned from the battle with his plane riddled by machine-gun bullets but escaped unscratched.

He was the first American pilot to be mentioned in air ministry accounts of battles over the channel for the past few weeks.

Tickled "I was never so tickled in my life," the American said describing his reactions to the battle.

"We went across the channel to look for trouble, but it was the Germans who found it. Four miles from Calais, at 10,000 feet, we saw five Messerschmitt-109s and somewhere

around was a larger group of them.

"We sailed right into them and our squadron leader set the pace by cracking down one Messerschmitt. He and another pilot saw it dive into the sea. Then another pilot chased one German toward France and shot pieces off it. I had a good crack at one myself, but suddenly found two others on me. Something hit the fuselage, shaking us a bit, but we came out of it quickly.

Whirled "While I whirled around another Messerschmitt fired into the cowl. I had another crack at him before he disappeared—then we turned for home."

He said he decided to join the RAF after France collapsed, went to Ottawa from Laredo and showed a logbook with 1,500 hours flying time.

"In fifteen minutes I was out on the street again with the promise that I would be on the next boat to England, and I was," he said.

The squadron to which he was assigned after three weeks of training in England already has nearly 30 German aircraft to its credit.

OREGON RESIDENT GETS FULL PARDON

DENVER, Aug. 8 (AP)—Governor Ralph L. Carr granted a full pardon yesterday to David H. Stead of Portland, Ore., who was paroled in 1923 from a Denver embezzlement sentence.

The pardon was urged by Governor Charles A. Sprague of Oregon, who declared Stead "has completely rehabilitated himself and is anxious to resume full citizenship," Gov. Carr said.

Stead served one year of a four-year sentence in the Colorado prison.
