COLLISION AT FIRST

That near-riot on first base during the early part of the KC-Lowell championship game Wednesday night has been interpreted only one way—as unnecessary roughness—but the players who collided cleared away ill feelings with a handshake afterwards and it may have been brought about by nothing worse than hair-trigger enthusiasm in the heat of the game.

When 210-pound Harry Hardiman, Tiger first baseman, poled out his line drive, he couldn't have failed to see it plunk kermack into the mitt of Shortstop King of the Knights. That should have been the big first baseman's cue to halt his steam engine trip down the baseline, but he didn't.

When he arrived at first he barreled into Carter McMullen with so much momentum that the KC first sacker was catapulted off the bag like a football dummy just hit by a Green Bay Packer fullback.

The collision failed to alter the outcome of the nicely-executed double play, King to McMullen, which caught Roy Wheeler off base and scored a double out, and left no grounds for an official protest, but the umpire, if he had seen fit, could have ruled Hardiman off the field.

Besides stirring up a near brawl among players and spectators, the play later forced McMullen, nursing a couple of broken ribs received in a previous game, out of the contest.

SURPRISING DAVIDS

Imagine the surprise of league officials and the publicity department when a squad of bearded gents showed up for a game, which, through a miscue either here or at the other end of the line, had been cancelled.

The bewhiskered House of David ball players must have been perturbed over the apparent lack of interest when they strolled out under the lights to provide the fans with a bit of nightcap comedy after the tension of KC's victory over Lowell.

Maybe it was a telegraph company that made the bungle, maybe another traveling House of David team pulled a fast one, or maybe a local softball mogul was too worried over the Lowell pitching squabble to take a phone call straight.

Anyway, a wire was received here that said: "Can play your team August 10." Whether it was signed just "House of David" or "Colored House of David" may never be determined, but Recreation Director Murray, taking it for granted that the message dealt with the tentative game here Wednesday night, wired back: "Schedule filled August 10. Will consider game August 7 cancelled."

Not another thought was given the matter until the long beards filtered into town and appeared in uniform for their tilt with Big Lakes.

The mystery may have some connection with a long-standing feud between the Israelite House of Davids, who made the unannounced appearance, and the Colored House of Davids, who did not, and will not.

LIEPERSVILLE, Pa., Aug. 8 (UP)—They say Bob Montgomery, the mystery mauler who is training here, will ruin Lightweight Champion Lew Jenkins' attempted comeback when they tangle at Philadelphia's Shibe park on August 19.

Throughout the cauliflower circuit they whisper that Montgomery, a broad-shouldered, spindle-legged negro, will knock out Jenkins more quickly than did Henry Armstrong three weeks ago. Hammering Hank required six rounds.

They say Montgomery can accomplish the feat in shorter order because he is a "super Armstrong"—which is really going in for superlatives.

Accordingly we came here to Jim Dougherty's historic training quarters, where so many great warriors have groomed in the past, to take a gander at pugilism's latest sensation.

In training the "Brown Bobcat" shapes up as a formidable fighter. Though taller than Armstrong, he marches in with virtually the same rolling bob and weave, throwing punches persistently from going to gong. His arms are longer than Armstrong's and he seems to hit harder.

Frankie Thomas, Montgomery's manager, insists the bobcat has stamina and he points to three bouts with Al Nettlow, a top-flight performer to prove it. Two of those bouts went 10

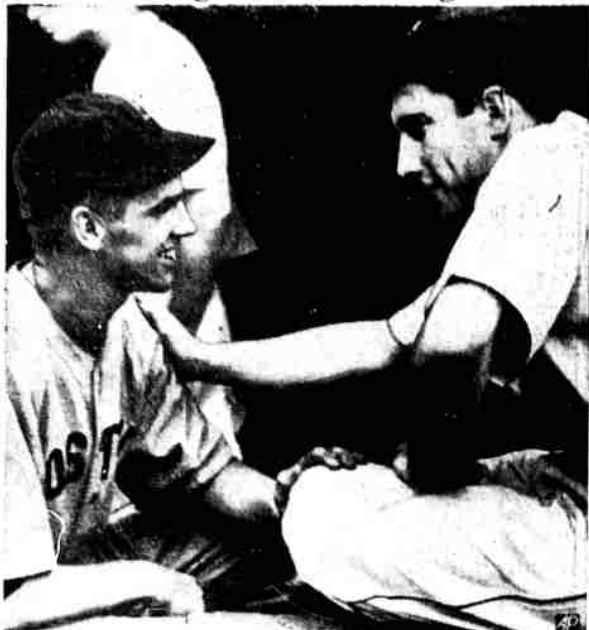

BOBBY RIGGS ADVANCES IN RYE TOURNEY

RYE, N. Y., Aug. 8 (UP)—Frank Shields of New York, the nation's top-ranking stylist in 1933, recovered some of his fading glory Wednesday when he upset Gilbert Hunt of Washington, D. C., 6-3, 5-7, 9-7, and advanced to the quarter-finals of the Eastern Grass Court championships.

Another upset that marked the fifth day of competition came when Hal Surface of Kansas City bowed to Joe Hunt of Annapolis, Md., in straight sets, 6-1, 6-2. Surface provided the first upset of the tourney Tuesday when he eliminated Welby Van Horn, nationally ranked fourth.

Riggs Wins
Robert L. Riggs of Chicago, national champion and defending titleholder, eliminated Seymour Greenberg, national public parks title holder, 6-4, 6-3 to join Shields in the quarter-finals bracket.

Frank Parker of Pasadena, No. 2 ranking U. S. star and third seeded, also advanced to that round by eliminating Fred Schroeder, Los Angeles, junior national champion, 6-2, 6-4.

Don McNeill, Oklahoma City, seeded second, defeated Gardner Mulloy, Coral Gables, Fla., seeded fifth, 6-2, 9-7, and Bryan Grant, Atlanta, seeded eighth, defeated James J. Thackara, New York, 6-4, 6-2, to complete the quarter-final bracket.

Pederson Downed
In women's singles former National Champ Helen Jacobs, seeded second, triumphed over Helen Pederson, of Stamford, Conn., 8-6, 6-1. Sarah Palfrey, Reno, Nev., third on the select list, defeated Margaret Osborne San Francisco, 6-1, 6-0.

Helen Bernhard of New York, fourth seeded, won from Mrs. John Van Ryn of Austin, Tex., 9-7, 7-5, while Gracy Wheeler, Santa Monica, Calif., fifth seeded, took the measure of Valerie Scott of England, 6-4, 6-3; Dorothy May Bundy, seeded seventh, defeated Patricia Canning, Alameda, Calif., 5-7, 6-3, 6-3, and Pauline Betz, Los Angeles, won from Louise Raymond, Scarsdale, N. NEW YORK, Aug. 8 (UP)—

Had Lou Boudreau been permitted to play out a natural collegiate career he probably would not yet be up in the American league. But now he is playing brilliantly at shortstop for the second place Cleveland Indians because a verbal agreement with the Tribe for first call on his services after graduation cut short his scholastic career.

He skipped a semester to take spring training last year, played in 115 games with Buffalo for a batting average of .331 and then finished out the 1939 season with the Indians in fine style.

White Sox Whipped
Boudreau's performance Wednesday as Cleveland walloped the Chicago White Sox, 9-3, to remain within a half a game of first place, was typical of the play that has made him a top-ranking star in the first full season in the majors. In five times at bat, he slashed out two homers and a single, drove in six runs and scored three. His current batting average for 103 games rose to .310 and his total runs driven in to 66.

Detroit kept at the head of the league with a 7-5 win over the St. Louis Browns. Five runs in the third inning salted away the game for the Tigers who rapped two pitchers for 14 hits.

The Boston Red Sox handed the New York Yankees their fifth straight defeat, 10-7 in the first game of a doubleheader but the champions gained an even

break with a 6-3 victory in the nightcap. The Red Sox pounded out 16 hits, including homers by Bobby Doerr and Joe Cronin in the first game. Homers by Jim Tabor and Cronin accounted for all the Boston runs in the second game while the Yanks pushed over three in the ninth to win.

Philadelphia at Washington was rained out.

Reds Lose to Cubs

In the National league, the leading Cincinnati Reds dropped their eighth game in 11 starts as the Chicago Cubs jumped on Paul Derringer for three runs in the 10th and score a 5-3 victory. Homers by Bill Nicholson and Jimmy Gleason provided Chicago with a tie. Claude Pascau retired the Reds with one run in the bases full and one out in their half of the 10th.

Pittsburgh crushed the St. Louis Cardinals in both ends of a double bill, 10-9 and 12-6.

Eddie Miller's third homer in as many games led the Boston Bees to a 6-3 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies tonight. Bill Fiedel scattered 10 hits for his seventh win which increases the Bees' seventh place lead over the Phils to three games.

The Brooklyn Dodgers climbed to within five games of the leading Reds as they helped celebrate "Mel Ott night" by scoring an 8-4 victory over the New York Giants before 53,997 fans at the Polo grounds, biggest night crowd of the season.

Brooklyn trailed for six innings but fashioned a five-run rally in the seventh inning to take the lead for keeps. The Dodgers slammed out 14 hits, including a homer by Dixie Walker, off Carl Hubbell and Hal Schumacher. Fred Fitzsimmons, who pitched six frames for the Dodgers, was credited with his 11th win. Vito Tamulis finished up.

Elizabeth Hicks Leads Golf Derby

WILMETTE, Ill., Aug. 8 (UP)—Defending Champion Elizabeth Hicks, Long Beach, Calif., made an almost certain bid to retain her title in the Women's Western Golf derby Wednesday with a two under par 74 third round that gave her an 11-stroke advantage over the field.

The 110-pound west coast golf writer picked up five birdies, a pair of them on 25-foot putts, to match the low score of the meet made Tuesday by Illinois champion Ellamae Williams, Chicago.

Miss Williams, who went into the third round tied with Miss Hicks, lost her touch and ended up with a nine over par 85 and a total of 241 for 54 holes. Miss Hicks' 54-hole total of 230 meant she could better her 1939 tournament record of 306 if she can break par again Thursday in the final round.

Virginia Ingram, Chicago, and Mary Agnes Wall, Menominee, Mich., posted 84 and 83, respectively, to deadlock at 248 in third place.
