

RAF REPORTS HEAVY BLOWS ON FACTORIES

(Continued from Page One)

LONDON, Aug. 10 (AP)—German bombers, power-diving at 400 miles an hour, unloaded explosives in mass attacks today on British ships protected by balloon barrages and rained whistling bombs on coastal Britain in heavy "terror" raids.

The Germans attacking the southeast coast were reported to have been driven off by anti-aircraft fire without hitting their targets.

(The Nazi high command claimed destruction of 12 of the big balloons, anchored to the ships by long cables, in Thursday's heavy fighting over the English channel.)

Attacking one of the biggest assaults of the war that the northwest coast has experienced, the Nazis dropped a dozen whistling bombs, whose ear-splitting screaming frightens as well as does damage.

Heavy explosive bombs showered on another sector in that area killed four persons, injured two and damaged residential property but missed military objectives.

Two men were killed and a number injured in a raid on a northeast coastal town.

In a second raid on shipping off the southeast coast, German bombers ran into heavy anti-aircraft fire, hurriedly deposited three bombs which missed their mark and scurried back toward France.

WPA UNABLE TO MAN ART CENTER HERE

Executive officers of the Klamath Falls Art Center association announced Saturday they had been informed that the works progress administration does not have instructors to assign to the local art center if it should be established.

Executive board members have received a letter from Charles Val Clear, director of Oregon art centers, to the effect that the WPA has lost "many of our qualified artist personnel." He said he has no assurance he can place "even one or two competent teachers in your community."

The state director added: "I believe that the only sensible and wise thing to do now is to have your board consider the establishment of an art center as impractical. I personally and sincerely regret that we can no longer plan to aid in the establishment of the center."

Board members stated that another problem, in addition to personnel, is the task of adequate facilities for housing the art center even if it were approved.

About \$800 in cash and some \$400 more in pledges have been given to the art center by the public in Klamath county. A total of at least \$1500 was needed.

Board members said that if the center cannot go through as planned, the money will be returned to the donors. Arrangement of a method to do this will now be made, and in the meantime further investigation will be made by the board to determine if the art center project must be abandoned entirely.
