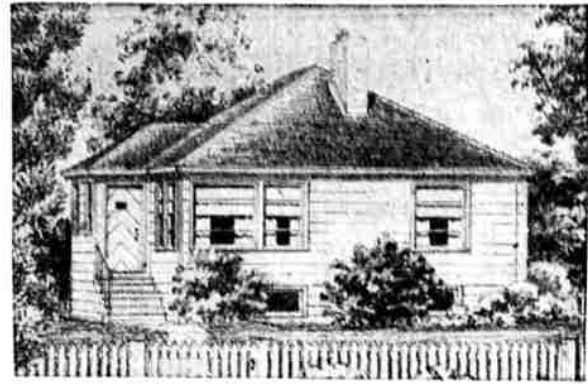

Fine Type of Western Home Designated As "The Klamath"



From its "Western Living Homes" series, Western Homes foundation this week presents a design of modern character that is particularly suited to suburban living or for a small country place. The design is the "Klamath," one selected by the national plan service as a fine type of true western home. It is a larger home than the illustration indicates, both side and rear having more footage than the front.

"While the Klamath is moderate in size and cost in comparison with the average home built within city limits, it is above the average of country homes built by families who have sought escape in recent years from old, crowded urban neighborhoods," says W. C. Bell, chairman of Western Homes foundation. "Yet it is a design which even the family of restricted means would do well to consider, particularly in a view of economics that might be effected by building on a shelter basis at first, and then completing the home during occupancy by the family."

"National authorities in planning and housing are only now awakening to the fact that families in the old districts of every population center are taking the road to the country for home ownership. There has been too much attention paid to housing theories and to housing legislation rooted in theory, and too little attention paid to what people want to do and are able to do for themselves."

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"A 1939 survey of Peoria, Ill., produced some startling evidence. Over 20,000 families in that area have gone outside the city limits to find home ownership. Another example is in the Detroit region. There, by 1929, enough streets had been laid out and services installed on land, mostly outside the city limits, to provide homes for a population double that of the city. These developments took the form of 'frozen assets' with Detroit banks as the depression gathered force. The banks closed in February, 1933, starting a nationwide wave of bank calamities. But today the once frozen assets of Detroit banks are practically all liquidated. Those real estate developments were, after all, sound."

"Here is why. Three years ago the renting families of the automobile capital grew tired of living in decaying dwellings in blighted districts, while waiting for public aid in housing. They began to go out to the suburbs and the country to buy land and build homes. This movement has become a migration. Thousands of acres of land, subdivided in the late twenties and lying idle for 10 years, lifeless but for weeds, have blossomed into young, vital residential neighborhoods."

"People have learned that the automobile and the new highways that lead into population centers offer a means to own new homes with plenty of land, room, with travel to and from city jobs easy and inexpensive. This is the basis of the new movement, to which the building industry is giving every service in its power."

The shop was enlarged through removal of partitions and a portion of the balcony. Each booth is curtained for privacy, yet remains cool and roomy. 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Long Out-Moded Pantry May Be On Its Way Back

The younger generation is likely soon to be introduced to the long out-moded pantry — once indispensable to every well kept kitchen.

Zero-cold storage for a wide assortment of frosted vegetables, fruits, berries, meats and sea-foods is the reason.

Introduction of household lockers has been long expected by refrigeration engineers who have watched more than a million American families begin using commercial lockers in central frosted food plants. They now can have the same service at home — a modern "pantry" filled with fresh frosted foods.

Users of frosted foods long have maintained that fresh frozen foods of all kinds are uniformly better than "fresh" foods, because frosted foods are preserved by the quick-freezing process within a few minutes, or a few hours at the most, of the actual harvest. The new household locker, christened "deep freeze," is designed to keep them fresh for months.

The household frosted foods locker consists of a combination food chest and cooling element. It is in the form of a double-walled cylinder that circulates refrigerant between the walls, completely surrounding the food. A compressor is housed beneath a small hood at the side.

With such a locker in the

basement, it is possible for the family to buy large amounts of frosted vegetables, fruits, seafoods, meats and poultry. Several months' supply can be bought when prices are low and kept on hand — ready for use any time.

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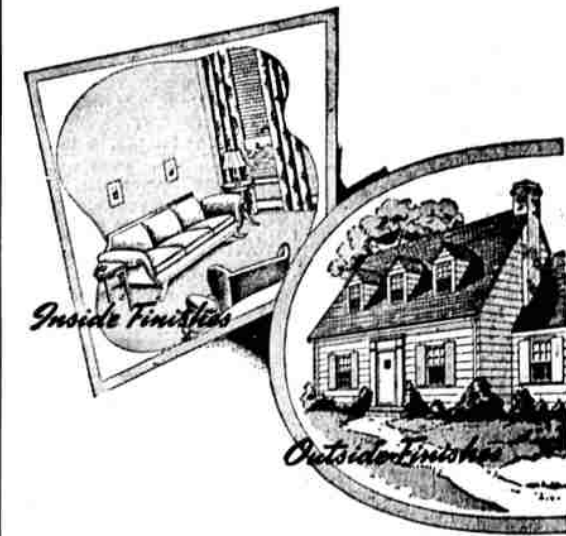
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
