

STYLE TRENDS NOTED DURING BUYING JAUNT

Alfred Gray of LaPointe's, ladies ready-to-wear store, has just returned from a buying trip to New York and Chicago and reports that styles for the fall and winter seasons are decidedly different, styles that are "tops" from a man's point of view as well as a woman's.

"Side-saddle" drapery, straight narrow skirts and sleek front folds are important new treatments for both coats and dresses. Lavishly fur-trimmed coats take on new charm with distinctive style interpretations—side fasteners, square shoulders, mellow sleeves and full fronts, Gray reports. Dress coats are fitted in most instances, while the casual sports coats are in the classic "boxy" manner and come in camels hair, tweeds and coverts. A zipper lining that can be removed when the weather is not too cold will also be featured this fall.

Costume suits will be more popular than ever this season, Gray says, and will include both long and short coats. Some are heavily fur-trimmed.

Gray noted that an important trend in dresses is the slightly modified side drape. Front fullness in skirts is good and necklines are high with surplice effects, high collars and modified V's and all sleeve lengths. Nails and head trimming is extremely smart, according to Gray, and materials are silk crepe, rib crepe, silk faille, transparent velvet and velveteen, with black, brown, soldier blue, green and wine the important colors.

"Back to school" garments are in vogue and solid color skirts, plain and with sunburst pleats, and contrasting jackets. Gayly colored sweaters in angora and the new "jumbo" knit, and dresses in corduroy, velveteen and light, soft wools have a definite youth appeal, Gray believes.

According to Gray, no costume is complete without one of the patriotic emblem pins which vary in style and price. Bags will be unusual in shape and made of doecskin, suede and leather. Forstmann's "kittens ear" broadcloth is also used extensively.

American designers seem unanimous in demanding that the fashionable woman show her face, Gray says, and the result is the Pompadour hat. Other off-the-face hats and the military styles with high crowns and visors will be popular, he says.

The casual tailored sports hat with brim will always have a place in the wardrobe of the women of today, Gray declares, and velvets will be the popular material. Feathers from a mere quill to an extra wing or bird will be seen on hats for dressy occasions and for evening wear. There will be considerable fur trim and many hats entirely of fur. Veils are in abundance. This season's hats are really flattering, Gray says, which makes them easy to wear and entirely feminine.

Gray stated that buying for the retail trade seemed to be exceptionally heavy with both buyers and manufacturers predicting a good business year.

Overriding Chairman King (D-Utah), Senators Austin (R-Vt.) and Schwelmbach (D-Wash.) voted to substitute this proposal for a bill approved by the house several weeks ago which would direct deportation of Bridges.

HEAVIEST BOMB RAIDS OF WAR ROCK ENGLAND

vented all but 55 from reaching their goal.

At first, the raids were a repetition of the fierce German assaults yesterday on the channel coast, but they spread as far as northeast England and the air ministry said "later reports show that large scale activity is taking place over a wide area in the channel and Thames estuary."

It said there had been a few casualties, only one of them fatal.

The new British bag was in addition to the Nazi planes shot down yesterday in one of the greatest air battles of the war. Official reports said 60 and unofficial reports said 69 German planes were destroyed.

INCREASE REVEALED IN CHURCH CENSUS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12 (AP)—The census bureau has listed 256 religious denominations in the United States, with 55,807,366 members.

This count—nearly half the population—was based on 1936 statistics, which have just been completed.

The membership total was about a million larger than a similar count in 1926, which showed 54,576,346. No major shifts were shown among major religious branches, however.

Economies forced on churches by the depression, while not shown in membership figures, were demonstrated by a \$518,953,571 calculation of total church expenditures in 1936. In 1926, the total was \$817,214,528.

The largest single denomination was Roman Catholic with 19,914,937 members.

Other large denominations included: Jewish 4,641,184; negro Baptists, 3,782,464; Methodist Episcopal church, 3,509,763; Southern Baptist convention, 2,000,153; Methodist Episcopal church, south, 2,061,683; Presbyterian church in the United States of America, 1,797,927; Protestant Episcopal church, 1,735,335; Northern Baptist convention, 1,329,044; and Congregational and Christian churches, 976,388.

Smallest denomination listed was the "Friends (Primitive)" with one church and 14 members.

GRANGERS FAVOR BIG SUGAR QUOTA

Klamath Pomona grangers at their meeting at Bonanza Saturday afternoon urged a more liberal sugar production quota for the continental United States as "a military precautionary measure and a safeguard for the American farmer."

The resolution pointed out that production of sugar in continental United States is only about 30 per cent of peace time requirements, and sources of insular and foreign imports of sugar are vulnerable to attack by certain foreign nations.

Copies of the resolution were ordered sent to the U. S. department of agriculture, Congressman Pierce, Senators Holman and McNary, and to the Oregon state senate.

The sugar resolution was the outstanding business of the grange session.

France Completes Demobilization of Armed Forces

VICHY, France, Aug. 12 (AP)—Demobilization of the French army will be completed Wednesday, it was announced today, with release of the last specialists, such as butchers and bakers.

Of the approximately 5,000,000 men mobilized during the war, it now is admitted that 2,000,000 were captured by the Germans. No considerable number of these have been released so far.

After demobilization only sufficient troops will be retained to maintain public order and guard certain vital points such as coastal and colonial centers.

The last class to join the colors—youth who were 20 years old in 1939—was held over and organized into youth brigades. Led by career army officers, these groups will work on public improvements, repair war damages and receive athletic training.
