THAT FRANCHISE AGAIN

Under an agreement reached during last spring's baseball shakeup, the Red Sox franchise, transferred to Dorris for the season, reverts to Klamath Falls after Sunday's windup victory over Hill. That game brought Lumberjack activities to a close for the year and at the same time brings back the problem of what to do with the once-champion nine of the Northern California league.

Two invitations to join the state league were turned down last spring because of the lack of facilities for night games here—a situation which has subsequently been changed by the opening of Recreation park. Nothing stands in the way of the locals accepting another invitation except the problem of fielding a team that could stand up in state league competition.

With a park suitable for night games and three or four players on the Lumberjack roster available as a nucleus, the way lies open to build a team which could enter the statewide circuit.

AN EMPLOYMENT PROBLEM

Baseball suffered about a two-year setback in Klamath Falls because of the transfer of the franchise to Dorris, but under the circumstances no other path was open and at least part of the team was held together. During the season just closed, however, managers were unable to bring in anything outstanding in the way of material.

Both Bend and Medford would benefit by Klamath's entrance into the state league. Travel distance would be cut in half and distance teams could book into southern Oregon. Consequently, another invitation will probably be directed this way.

The problem confronting a sponsor of the new Klamath team is furnishing new ballplayers with jobs and salaries attractive enough to draw and hold players of the state league calibre.

The sponsorship should be anything but a risk, however. With state league competition offered local fans, Recreation park could be jammed to capacity as often as league teams were brought here.

BOB FELLER TAKES MOUND IN PLAYOFF

Oscar Vitt was in the happy position of being able to send Bob Feller, the best pitcher in the business, to the mound Monday as his Cleveland Indians opened an important two-game series against the Detroit Tigers at Cleveland.

The two clubs fought their way into a tie for the American league lead Sunday, each with 64 wins and 44 losses, and the outcome of their battles might have a vital bearing on the race.

With Feller firing them across for the Indians and trying to back up his 20th victory of the year, Manager Del Boker of the Tigers was forced to call upon John Gorschka, his freshman ace, who has won 7 and lost 5. He didn't have a veteran star ready for duty.

The Tigers suffered two painful losses to the Chicago White Sox Sunday, each by scores of 4 to 3, to lose the leadership. The Sox knocked ace Buck Newsom from the hill in the first and beat Tommy Bridges in the nightcap.

Cleveland gained a full game by splitting with the St. Louis Browns. Al Milnar scored his 15th win as the Indians took the first game, 12 to 4, but the Browns came back to knock Johnny Allen and Al Smith from the hill and capture the second, 7 to 6.

A brilliant youngster and a game veteran waged a thrilling mound duel at Washington, and in the end young Sid Hudson of the Senators beat Lefty Grove of the Red Sox, 2 to 1.

The Yankees made it three straight wins over the Philadelphia Athletics when Joe Gordon slatted a homer into the left field stands in the 11th.

Cincinnati's National League lead was whittled to five games as the champions bowed to the St. Louis Cardinals twice, 3 to 2 and 3 to 1. Mort Cooper set the Reds down with two hits to beat Paul Derringer in the first, and Lon Warneke cut them down in the second. Enos Slaughter's two-run homer decided the opener.

Brooklyn gained a game by splitting with the Boston Bees. Bill Posedel, a former teammate of the Dodgers, 3 to 2, in the first, but Lefty Vito Tamulis blanked the Bees, 3 to 0, to make it a draw for the day.

Frankie Frisch's amazing Pittsburghers scored twice over the Chicago Cubs, 7 to 3 and 5 to 1, vaulting into fourth place only two games back of the New York Giants.
The Phillies and the Giants broke even at Shibe park. Kirby Higbe snapped a nine-game losing streak for the Phils when he beat the Giants, 2 to 0, in the opener. Hal Schumacher then pitched an equally arduous victory for the Phils, 8 to 2, as he set the Phils down with three hits.

Clyde Carlstrom, mainstay of the Dorris Klamath Lumberjacks, kept 11 hits well scattered Sunday at the Dorris diamond as the locals ended their Northern California league schedule by defeating Hill 8 to 2.

As Mt. Shasta, Dunsmuir, Redding and McCloud gained spots in the league playoffs which get underway next Sunday, the Lumberjacks closed a mediocre season well down in the league standings and out of the running for the pennant.

Final standings will not be announced until two protests are settled, one of which was filed by Dunsmuir early in the season against Yreka, and another by McCloud against Dunsmuir, filed two weeks ago.

Mt. Shasta edged the strong Dunsmuir nine Sunday by a 4-3 score, Redding down Yreka 14-5, and McCloud blanked Weed 12-0.

The Lumberjacks were paced in the hitting department by Jack Shaw, who poled out a home run, and by Paul Bernadotte, who annexed three hits. It will be the final game of the year for the locals, most of whom played last summer on the local champion Klamath Red Sox.

In next Sunday's playoffs Mt. Shasta will entertain the Dunsmuir nine and McCloud will meet the Redding Tigers at Redding.

Riggs Outsmarts Don McNeill in Net Final

RYE, N. Y., Aug. 12 (P)—Don't let Bobby Riggs' ridiculous duck waddle and his boyish manners disarm you. They hide one of the shrewdest brains in tennis.

Ask Don McNeill, the national clay courts champion, who was almost ready to feel sorry for the supposedly-slipping national champion before they took to the courts for the eastern grass courts final Sunday.

For Don was the gallery idol, the man who was to deliver tennis from a champion who hasn't exactly been a victim of popularity. But Don was victimized by "Rube" Robert 6-2, 3-6, 7-5, 6-4 simply because the little guy is able to visualize every opponent's weakness, and is fully able to rise to whatever occasion presents itself.

For a slinger like McNeill, the Riggs' brain has figured out the answer—steadiness. He covered worlds of courts, returning shot after shot until Don's durability wore out.

RYE, N. Y., Aug. 12 (UP)—Alice Marble added another victory Saturday to one of the great winning streaks of tennis.

Forty minutes after she stepped on the courts of the Westchester County club, Miss Marble walked off a winner over Helen Jacobs in the final of the American grass courts championship. The scores were 6-1, 6-0—the worst defeat Miss Jacobs ever has suffered in the six times she has faced the Beverly Hills, Calif., blonde.

To the crowd of 5000 it was a routine affair—the tennis spectators are getting tired of seeing Miss Marble win. And that's why a great winning streak is going ignored.

Last season in '38

Three years ago, on the historic courts of Wimbledon, Miss Marble suffered her last defeat and it was Miss Jacobs who conquered her. She returned to the United States, won the national championship and finished off the year with victories in 21 straight matches.

Last year she won every tennis title available—the singles, doubles and mixed doubles championships of both the United States and England—and had a run of 42 consecutive victories in singles competition. This year she won 34 straight for a total of 97 consecutive singles triumphs since that afternoon in 1938 at Wimbledon.

The way she played Saturday even the other great women tennis players of the past—Moody, Lenglin, Mallory—would have found her hot to handle. Miss Marble moved into a 2-0 lead at the start of the match, lost service in an 18-point third game, and then went on to win with a run of ten consecutive games.

Trophy Given

After it was over, they presented the championship trophy—for keeps—to the lithe, 26-year-old girl. The big silver bowl will join the other Miss Marble won because she retired it from competition with her third straight victory in the tournament.

At his camp near scenic Grossinger lake he was 180 as late as last Monday. But Tuesday his boils came back. He flew to Pittsburgh to have one treated and had to take hot baths as part of the cure.

Such being the case, Billy the Kid is going to find himself in for no circus. A classy boxer, himself, he is tangling with one of the best ring generals among the bigger fellows, a determined battler who has gone 21 rounds with Joe Louis and has dented the championship hopes of many another aspirant besides Conn before now.

Youth Captures National Skeet Shoot Crown

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Aug. 12 (UP)—Dick Shaughnessy, 18-year-old Bedham, Mass., marksman, was crowned champion of the sixth annual national skeet shoot Saturday when he shattered 50 consecutive birds in a short-off match with two other sharpshooters.

Going into the final of the five-day meet, Shaughnessy tallied 249 birds out of a possible 250 to tie with Alex Kerr, of Beverly Hills, Calif., and Phil Hawkins of Dallas, Tex., in the all-bore event.

Kerr missed three birds in the first 25 on the shootoff, while Hawkins dropped the 34th bird. Shaughnessy blasted 50 in a row. The Texas state team, piloted by Hawkins, nailed the five-man team title, scoring 1228 out of a possible 1250.

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
