

AVIATION DAY PROCLAIMED BY RICHMOND

Mayor Clifton Richmond has proclaimed August 19 as national aviation day.

The proclamation follows:
PROCLAMATION
WHEREAS the development of aeronautics in recent years has been so rapid that aviation in its many phases has come to exert a profound influence on the course of events throughout the world; and

WHEREAS American initiative and industry have contributed greatly to this development and should be encouraged to continue such contribution in order that the United States may retain its outstanding position in the field of aeronautics; and

WHEREAS Public Resolution No. 14, 76th Congress, approved May 11, 1939 (53 Stat. 739), provides:

"That the president of the United States is authorized to designate August 19th of each year as NATIONAL AVIATION DAY, and to issue a proclamation calling upon officials of the government to display the flag of the United States on all government buildings on that day, and inviting the people of the United States to observe the day with appropriate exercises to further and stimulate interest in aviation in the United States";

NOW THEREFORE, I, CLIFTON RICHMOND, mayor of the city of Klamath Falls, Oregon, do hereby designate August 19th, 1940, as NATIONAL AVIATION DAY, and invite the citizens of the city of Klamath Falls to properly observe this day and help stimulate further interest in aviation in this city.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the city of Klamath Falls to be affixed.

Another addition to the South Sixth street industrial section was nearing completion this month with the announcement of a \$15,000 service station which is being built by Marshall E. Cornett on the South Sixth street frontage of Modoc Gas and Oil company property.

Cornett said the modern station, which will be one of the most up-to-date plants in the county, will open September 1, with Carl Youngren as operator. Frank Hayworth is foreman on the structure. Three pumps are being installed with all concrete driveways and lot. There is a 3000 gallon storage tank installed and other features will include hydraulic hoists and equipment rooms.
