Tailored styles are often softly feminine, sometimes classically tailored, with pleated skirts, nicely detailed bodices and little collars. Afternoon dresses acquire distinction by side draping, front fullness, and lower waistlines.

"Hats are no longer crazy. They, too, reflect good taste and breeding. Light-hearted and frivolous, yet combined with a serene sanity. For one thing, they cling firmly to the head through blustery winter winds. Deftly manipulated turbans, off-the-face berets, and forward-tilted toques, all are on to stay. Mannish sports hats are classic or softly feminine. Bright feathers and veils add a dash of color. Rich velvet will be seen everywhere.

"Pumps—not plain ones, but pretty, trimmed pumps—are worn with dressy, semi-dressy, and even casual clothes. The last are shorter looking this year and infinitely more flattering. Wedge and other novel heels add zest to the shoe picture.

"Handbags were never prettier, nor more practical. Every bag is capacious—as useful as it is decorative. Soft draping, meticulous tailoring, and little dressmaker trims reflect the new feminine trend. Long oblong pouches are particularly exciting.

"Trimmed gloves are feminine and flattering, add drama to your costume. Classic untrimmed gloves remain a favorite, to be worn for every occasion.

"I was so thrilled at the preview of this winter's fashions," says Miss Lander. "They're all so pretty, so feminine and gracious."

Bahama Society Wonders If Wally Can Balance the Official Household Budget

NASSAU, The Bahamas, August 14 (UP)—The Duke and Duchess of Windsor are expected to arrive in Nassau about "the middle of the month"—probably next Friday—and society is excitedly wondering whether the "personal touch" of the American-born duchess can transform the old government house decorations without exceeding the officially stipulated budget.

The approximate date of the couple's arrival was disclosed in an official communication from London which said the duke hoped to take up his new duties as governor and commander in chief of the Bahamas in mid-August.

Wally Fixes Plans
The plans for injecting the personality of the duchess into redecoration of the official residence came in a wireless message from Wally herself, asking that nothing be touched until she arrived.

The Bahamian house of assembly, after an hour of debate, recently authorized \$8000 for redecoration and it was understood that the duchess planned to work with her friend, Lady Mendl, in decorating the 140-year-old mansion.

At present the main living room furniture in the mansion is done in rose—the favorite color of Queen Mother Mary—and a ten-foot tall picture of the queen as a youthful bride dominates the spacious dining room.

Stories Have Arisen
Fantastic stories have sprung up here regarding treasures which the duke and duchess are bringing to bedeck the house. These stories have aroused some fear among friends of the couple that a delicate situation would be created if local society gets the impression that their tastes were too extravagant. More than one governor at Nassau has seen his requests for a change of residence or increased living credits flatly and hotly rejected by the local legislature.

The outgoing governor, Sir Charles Bundas, after completing the construction of new government houses on fashionable Prospect heights tried to get the legislature to approve transfer of his official residence there but was refused. Any desire on the part of the duke and duchess to move from the present mansion built in 1801 and containing seven bedrooms, six bathrooms and 24 other rooms, including the executive council chambers, private secretary's office and grand ballroom, probably would meet similar objections.

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
