SPUD FESTIVAL PLANS UNDER WAY IN BASIN

MERRILL—Names of candidates who will compete for the crown of the potato kingdom this fall, prior to the two-day fest to be held October 18-19, are expected to be in the hands of the festival committee in the next few days.

Merrill's elimination dance on August 31 will start the ball rolling for other communities of the basin and young women of Merrill, Malin, Tulelake, Bonanza, Henley and possibly other points in the basin will be on the list.

The election will follow the same plan as in the past. Each community will sponsor more than one candidate, candidates winning the right to serve home towns by sale of tickets to the dance. The queen's ball will be held here, probably in September when this year's sovereign will be introduced to her subjects.

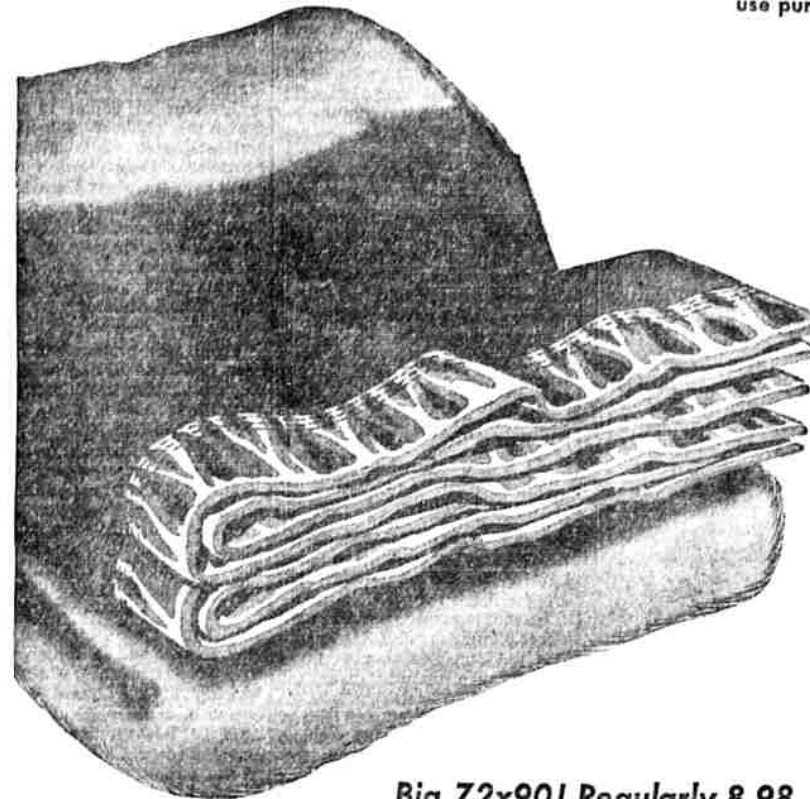

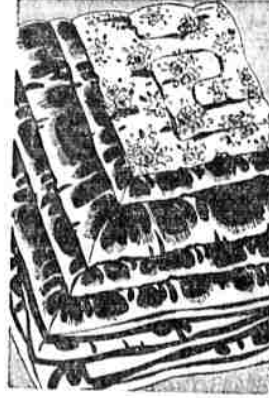
